A U. of O. Man Will Help Spend \$6,000,000

Portland, Or., July 10.—Dr. F. C. McLean, formerly of the University of Oregon medical school staff, and C. A. Coolidge a Boston architect, will leave tonight for China to spend \$6,000,000 of the Rockefeller foundation's money in medical experimentation in China.

Hospitals as good as the best in this country will be built in Shanghai and Peking. Coolidge will have charge of the construction of the buildings. They will cost \$1,000,000. The institutions will be endowed with \$5,000,000.

The movement is part of the plan of the Rockefeller foundation to carry western medicine into China and teach the Chinese how to use it.
