MINISTERS AFRAID BETS WILL BE MADE

Sheriff Advises Them "To Bet They Will Not, If They Want Easy Money"

Chicago, July 14.—Chicago ministers are not as optimistic as officials over anti-betting prospects at the Hawthorne races starting tomorrow. The ministers fear gambling on a large scale and today Revs. Melbourne Boynton and W. B. Millard appealed to Sheriff Traeger to prevent betting at the track. "If you want easy money," Traeger told the ministers, "bet there will be no bookmaking at Hawthorne tomorrow or any other day during the meeting." Arrangements practically are completed for the meet. Five starters in the \$10,000 derby are stabled. A sixth Dick Williams, is expected. The entries are:

Speaker Leads Batters.

Cleveland, Ohio, July 14.—Tris Speaker today is the leading batsman in the American league by a margin of 22 points. Speaker is slugging .387. Joe Jackson is second with .365, and Ty Cobb third, 10 points below Jackson. Jack Graney leads the league in two base hits with 26. Poe Jackson leads in three base hits with 10. Frank Baker is home run leader, with eight, and Chick Gandil leads in sacrifice hits with 19. Speaker is the American league's best run getter with 63. Cobb has 60, Jack Graney being third with 57.

Old Work Horse Favorite.

Cleveland, Ohio, July 14.—Rescued from an express wagon, Billy Dale, aged 13, the oldest stake horse at North Randall, will go to the post a favorite in the classic Edwards \$3,000 pacing stake Monday. Walter Cox, part owner of the horse, is driving Billy. The Edwards stake is the blue ribbon event for the Grand Circuit opening meet. Billy has been clocked in 2:03 and in trials this year has stepped 2:06 without being paced. Billy's chief rivals are Tommy Murphy's The Problem and Marvin Child's Ben Earl.

Wants Smaller Scoop.

Chicago, July 14.—Anxious for another scrap between Ad Wolgast and Freddie Welsh, Larny Lichenstein, Wolgast's manager, will leave for New York tomorrow with a \$5,000 certified check as a bet that Wolgast can lick Welsh "in every round of a 10-round scrap."

Tournament Postponed.

Portland, Ore., July 14.—Postponement of the post-western invitational golf tournament scheduled to be held in Portland during the week beginning July 24 as a sequel to the western championship at Del Monte, Cal., was announced today. The fact that many eastern players will return by way of Portland was given as the reason for abandoning the tournament.

120 Will Take Part.

Del Monte, Cal., July 14.—One hundred and twenty golfers will tee off Monday when the Western golf championship tournament begins on the links of the Del Monte Country club, it was announced today by Secretary Jack Neville.

It begins to look, however, like the representation of golfers from east of the Rockies will be even smaller than had been anticipated. Hoover Bankhead, and Ed Sawyer, the Chicago cracks, were declared to be en route, but up to today had not put in an appearance. While awaiting for the tournament to open, California's stars are devoting daily to practice. Heinie Schmidt, Erving Armstrong and Vincent Whitney, all figured as formidable contenders for the title each went around in 73 yesterday, which is close to par. Armstrong and Schmidt are in fine form and are expected to better this score before the great day arrives.

Fight Was a Fizzle

Baltimore, Md., July 14.—Promoter Ben Pressler has probably staged his last fight in Baltimore. His shoe string entertainment at Oriole Park yesterday, ending in a ten round no-decision fight between Bathing Levinsky, New York, and Jack Dillon, Indianapolis, led authorities today to plan steps to close his promotion career here. When the smoke cleared from the verbal battle over division of the meager spoils, it developed that Dillon got \$1500 as his share of the gate and Levinsky \$1000, whereas \$7000 was to be sliced originally. Pressler himself got a panning and a little loose change. Fight fans were disgusted at the manner in which the financial end was scrambled and none too pleased with the fight itself. Levinsky outpointed Dillon.

Vernon Club Roasted

Los Angeles, Cal., July 14.—The selection of Tom Darmody as a director in the Pacific Coast league was considered certain today following the mental chastisement administered Ed L. Maier, president of the Vernon club by league directors last night. Maier was expelled from the league. He was represented at the meeting by Tom Darmody "general manager" of the league leaders. COOLNESS OF OREGON BOY SAVED HORSES

Held Up by Horse Thieves in the Dark He Takes Chances—and Wins

San Diego, Cal., July 14.—The coolness and nerve of a sentry of the Third Oregon infantry is responsible for the presence here today of a number of the officers' mounts in the corral of one of the troop camps at the border, near this city. The sentry drove off three horse thieves after they had surprised him with a pistol jammed in his stomach. The two remaining members of the party untethered several horses and prepared to lead them away. Watching his assailant, the sentry seized a moment when the man was looking toward his companions with the horses, knocked his gun away and jumped behind a bush. The raiders ran behind the nearest horse, just as the sentry fired with his automatic pistol. The soldier was Private Henry D. Bolton.

Whether the shot took effect could not be learned but the three bandits abandoned the horses and made away through the brush in the darkness, before other members of the guard could reach the scene. After a long search, the chase was abandoned. Whether the men were Mexican or white the guard could not state, because of the darkness. They spoke perfect English, however. Since the incident the patrol has been increased, and extra diligence is exercised to prevent a recurrence of the attempt to make away with the stock.
