The Slave Problem--The Birth of A Nation Covers It All

The slave trade in America and slavery as it existed prior to the war is exemplified in "The Birth of a Nation." D. W. Griffith's pictorial and musical elaboration of Thomas Dixon's "The Clansman," and "The Leopard's Spot."

This phase of political conditions is traced strikingly from the importation of the first slaves to the troubles that grew out of their freedom and consequent enfranchisement and subsequent tribulations of the south under carpet-bag rule.

From this the scene changes to ante bellum days, depicting the condition of the negro in the south at that time. Then comes the turmoil of war, and, finally, the rule of black over white with a mulatto lieutenant governor in the capitol of South Carolina and the Ku Klux Klan riding through the country-side to rescue their women and preserve their traditions.

Lincoln signing the emancipation proclamation is a favorite among the 5,000 odd scenes of the mighty spectacle.
