Will Strongly Protest Blacklisting Scheme

Washington, July 26.—After a conference this afternoon between President Wilson and Acting Secretary of State Polk it was learned a strong protest against British blacklisting of American firms and corporations would be sent to London in the next few days. The president and Polk discussed the situation for more than an hour. It is understood the protest will enter into the principle of the blacklist, leaving specific instances to be handled in different forms. For more than a week Polk has been giving practically his entire attention to the blacklist matter. He has heard numerous complaints, many of which he says, give more than sufficient ground for vigorous protest. Some of these, it is understood, already have been taken up with Ambassador Spring Rice here.

UNITED STATES TO BUY THREE SAINTS

Danish West Indies, St. Thomas, St. John and St. Croix Wanted

Washington, July 26.—Folks in the United States need the Danish West Indies. What probably will be America's baby province and will cost \$25,000,000, is in reality in second childhood. Columbus set foot on land comprised in its group of fertile islands before he sighted the continent of North America. There are still real natives there—the kind like those pictured in the paintings where Columbus is seen planting the flag of Spain on the sea beach with breech clouted Indian looking individuals peering at the ceremony from behind palm looking trees. There are three islands—St. Thomas, St. John and St. Croix. All are rocky, picturesque, volcanic ridges. The inhabitants—there are 32,870 on the three islands—are West Indian negroes, descendants of Indians and a few whites, the last named mostly overseers, plantation owners and merchants. Fifty years ago the islands thrived and basked in the sun of prosperity due to the cane sugar production. But improved methods in more up-to-date nations and principalities slackened its trade.

England Will Explain Its Blacklisting Move

Washington, July 26.—The British government will make a detailed explanation of the purposes and extent of application of its commercial blacklist in the house of commons in a day or two, it was officially announced to the British embassy today.

Ambassador Page at London called the state department today, saying he has had several conversations at the foreign office regarding the blacklist but no definite understanding has been reached.

Opening of Beach Resort Is Postponed

The weather man got his dates mixed and as a result, the formal opening of the bathing beach across the river, announced for this evening, has been indefinitely postponed, although it is probably that the ceremonies will take place early next week. This postponement of the formal opening will not in any way prevent anyone from enjoying the beach, as everything is ready and Arthur R. Wilson in charge from 2 o'clock in the afternoon until 9 in the evening. The bath houses will be completed by tomorrow, the log boom has been established for safety and the beach has been cleaned up. The beach and the river is there, awaiting the bathers. In addition to the bath houses, a band stand will soon be built on the grounds and the diving boards and other apparatus placed. In establishing this public bathing beach, one of the objects of the Civic department of the Commercial Club has been to provide a safe place for children, and for this reason there will be no charge for the youngsters under the age of 15. The beach slopes gradually into the water and with the life lines out and a man constantly in charge, the children as well as the grown-ups in Salem will now have an ideal picnicking and bathing resort. When the opening day is announced, the big automobile parade will take place, the Cherrian band will play and the swimming races will be on. The announcement of the name to be given the beach has also been postponed, and those who have several appropriate names on hand, may win a season ticket by suggesting a name that appeals to the judges. Middle West Swelters No Relief In Sight
Chicago, July 26.—Hotter weather for the middle west for the next three days was the prediction by the weather bureau here today. Since the present heat spell began—July 12—there has been an average excess of four degrees over seasonable temperatures. It will be several days at least before the back of the heat wave is

broken, the weather man says. Four deaths in Chicago within the last 24 hours were attributed to the heat.

Forty-five cities in the United States and two in Canada yesterday registered temperatures of ninety or above, while Chicago "got by" with 89 as its hottest for the day.

At Phoenix, Arizona, the mercury climbed to 106, making it the hottest spot in the country. Quincy, Illinois, was next with 105.

Kansas Is Cooking.
Topeka, Kan., July 26.—Kansas is sweltering today under highest temperatures of the year. From every part of the state reports of century mark temperatures and above are being received. A hint of hotness in the winds has caused fear that severe damage is being done to the corn of the state.

PLEADED NOT GUILTY
Winnipeg, Man., July 26.—Sir Redmond Roblin, ex-premier, Hon. G. R. Caldwell and Hon. J. H. Howden, ex-ministers, pleaded not guilty today when arraigned before Judge Fendegast on charges of conspiracy of theft. The court decided all three should be tried together. The jury is being empanelled.
