## BOTH COMMITTEES WOULD TAKE THEM IN Democrats and Republicans After Progressives and Equal Suffragists

New York, July 26.—Progressives and women of equal suffrage states are the chief bone of contention today in the scramble for presidential votes by the national committees of the democratic and republican parties. Chairman McCormick of the democratic national committee, stated today that he feels positive President Wilson will poll the majority of the votes of both of these groups. But the democrats are not going to allow the republicans with their Hughes alliance for women to get the jump. McCormick said he is perfecting an organization for women and will center the fight in the suffrage states. Republican leaders today Mrs. Harriet Stanton Blatch and a party of suffrage leaders spent considerable time in conference with Chairman Wilcox, making plans for corraling the votes of the women's party. As for progressive votes both parties are confident. With reference to the progressive issue at Syracuse on Saturday, Chairman McCormick said: "I feel very hopeful. When the New York state fathered by Perkins and Roosevelt fails to endorse Hughes it seems to me to be indicative of the sentiment of progressives throughout the entire country." He denied the democratic party was taking any steps to nurse the progressive convention to be held in Chicago August 5. Chairman Wilcox at republican headquarters expressed confidence in the progressive and referring to the statement of McCormick, said: "If they can find any comfort in Saturday's affair, it is fine for them, but continually flowing into my office are reports of a solid unification of the progressive party for one candidate Charles Evans Hughes." Chairman McCormick, who returned today from a conference with President Wilson stated that the chief executive had fully decided that he "will stick on the job and be president until his work is done and when congress closes he will jump into the campaign." Wilson hopes he may receive his official notification at his country home in Long Branch, N. J. during the last week of August. Wilcox stated today that while on his western tour Hughes will make some rear platform speeches. There will be no scheduled speeches for the train, but whenever the train stops and a delegation is present to greet Hughes, he will make a short address.

## Paints Word Picture of Columbia Highway

(By Molly Kueorn) A motor trip up the new Columbia Highway is a very wonderful journey. It matters not whether the trip is your first or your thirtieth, or whether your auto is a 1911 or 1916 model. The trip to the Highway whether from the south, the east, or the west may perhaps become monotonous, but the Highway itself is not monotonous and never will be. And the degree of wonder with which one views this already famous roadway rests entirely with one's temperament. When the Red man, a great many years ago traversed the same place he dreamed fantastic dreams, and wove mystery into mystery in his conception of nature's masterpiece. Three years ago Samuel C. Lancaster, an celebrated highway engineer stood in the same place, and dreamed a twentieth century dream, which gradually materialized into the present highway—one of the most beautiful in the world. "Probably no two persons have the same feeling in passing over the forty-two mile paved highway, but those who are a bit romantic must invariably think of poetry as the Indian did in a cruder way—years before. To the more practical mind the thought is more vital—can poetry, and concerns figures, and power and technical skill that can never be fully comprehended. Out from Portland broad meadows, attractive homes, with rose-decked gardens blend swiftly in a wide panorama. The Columbia stretches in a broad ribbon, silver-flecked in the sunlight. Parkway farms rise on its northern bank—a part of another state. Shallow mountains tower back of them higher and higher, displaying here and there a snow-capped peak. Mt. Hood looms up ahead, directly, it would seem, in the middle of the roadway—so big, and so suddenly that it startles one—almost. It stands out in its whiteness like a radiant natural monument against the cold blue of the sky. The road curves on and on, now losing sight of the mountain, now glimpsing it again. Through roaring canyons it winds, between walls of rock that extend steeply from the Columbia to a height, in places, exceeding the Washington monument. Mountain sides are climbed so gradually that it seems no ascent whatever. A sparkling stream is crossed at Chanticleer, and then in succession come Latourelle Falls, Shepherd Falls, Bridal Veil, Cooper Falls, Mist Falls, Waukeena Falls, Multnomah Falls, Oweata Tunnel, Horse Tail Falls, The Cascades, and other smaller ones. The roadway is very broad and very smooth, and the concrete railings, but so far as man and his ingenuity is concerned Crown Point, 225 feet above the river remains, perhaps, his most interesting and appreciated feat. This portion is described as having been one of the most difficult of handling of any of the entire route, the preservation of the natural beauty puzzling the ablest engineers. From here one gets a view thirty miles up the Columbia and thirty miles down it, which is undoubtedly the most beautiful point of the entire gorge. Automobiles laden with passengers from both directions who pass madly from other wonderful vistas, stop at Crown Point, and the view they get more than compensates for any sacrifice of time. This is magnificent. So wonderful in fact that one catches one's breath in delight at the beauty of it all. For the size of the crowds one is impressed with the quietness. Loud conversation is out of place, and a spell, as it were, somehow seems to linger over the people, who cannot help feeling a certain reverence and who must worship in their own individual way. Some form in admiring groups; some stroll off to be apart from the rest, and a bridal couple—there is always a bridal couple—stand frankly hand in hand. The Columbia flows softly far below, between graceful borders of greenery and blue-green mountains and fields. It is a dream river with bits of downy clouds reflected faintly. And in a trivial way, it is all being commercialized through postal and souvenir cards, that find a ready sale to the passing traveler, who writes a brief, inadequate description on them for far away friends who will never, perhaps, see the beautiful highway and the Columbia, but who will have to visualize it by a tiny sepia likeness.

## MILITIA ON BORDER NOT THERE FOR DRILL

### President Writes Letter to Woman Complaining of Hardships of Son

Washington, July 26.—That the services of the national guard on the border are "a necessity to the United States" in "protecting the country", and not merely "for the purpose of drill," was explained today in a letter written by President Wilson to Mrs. Henry Smith, of Winamac, Ind. The letter was in reply to one from Mrs. Smith expressing deep distress for the hardships her son was compelled to undergo as a militiaman. It follows: "My Dear Madame: Your letter of July 23 distresses me a good deal because it shows that you have not been correctly informed as to the purpose of having the national guard at the border. It is not for the purpose of drill, but the purpose of protecting the country. The service the men are performing there is an honor to them and a necessity to the United States. I cannot believe that the men in the national guard would wish to be excused from it or it would lose heart because of the discomfort and inconvenience of the service. The war department is using every means known to make them sanitary and safe against disease. The health of the men on the border,
