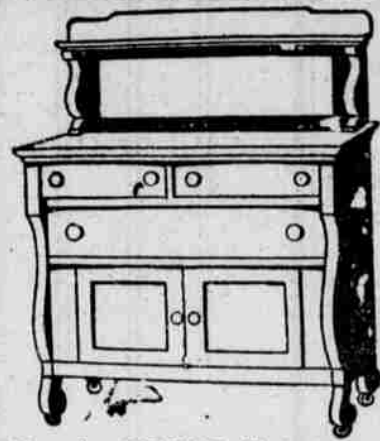

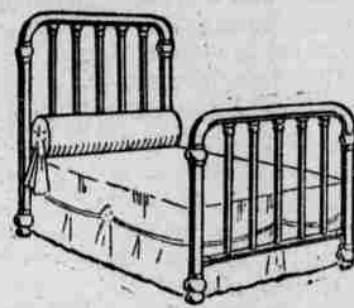

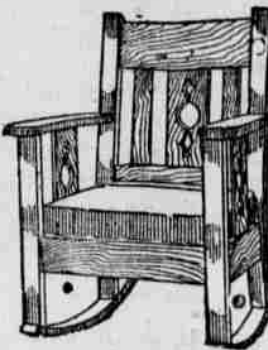

Franklin J. Miller Writes from the Front

The following letter from Franklin J. Miller of Company M to his father in the city gives an insight as to the life of the soldier on the Mexican border. He writes in part:

"We are at last settled into the routine of camp at Palm City although we may move to Imperial Beach about three miles from here and at the ocean. The water seems warmer there than at Newport."

"Yesterday we were issued coats and khaki breeches. Some of the boys have been issued new shirts, underwear, socks and shoes."

"The boys are all well and in good health. Several of them have gone to San Diego to see the sights and some to Imperial Beach to bathe. Our mascot, the goat, which was born July 4 of this year, is growing and seems happy."

"The money you sent me certainly comes in handy. I spend it for candies, cookies and such things as the mess does not seem to fill up. Most of the boys have to run a credit at the canteen. I do not know when pay day is nor does anybody."

"It rained some the other night and we were told it was the first rain in July for the past 11 years. The weather is cool and cloudy."

RUSSIANS GET

having been stormed and captured. Apparently there was a lull in the infantry attacks along the British front today. Fervid activity in throwing up entrenchments and consolidating their gains will be necessary so that the British can successfully withstand the German counter attacks and until this digging is accomplished, it is not expected that there will be another forward drive.

German Story of Day
Berlin, July 27.—Repulse of a British reconnoitering attack southwest of Warneton, near Riechbourg and failure of French assaults around Barleux and Fleury were reported in the German official statement today.

The war office likewise reported futile Russian attacks at bloody cost around Schiltach and west of Berostezko.

"A British reconnoitering attack southwest of Warneton and near Riechbourg was repulsed," the statement asserted.

"A French attack northeast of Barleux failed and attacks against Cold Heigt and Fleury were repulsed. Between the Aisne and the Somme there was intense artillery firing during the night."

"West of Potters a grenade attack was repulsed."

"Around Schiltach a Russian attack proved futile. West of Berostezko the enemy was likewise successfully repulsed."

The English Version
London, July 27.—Hand to hand encounters with the Germans and an active artillery pounding continuing throughout the night was reported today by Gen. Haig. He said the Tontons were using quantities of tear shells.

"No event of importance" was reported by the British commander in chief.

"Throughout the night," he said, "our artillery was active. We continued to press the enemy in hand to hand encounters at various points. Elsewhere the enemy was using gas and tear producing shells. There was no event of importance."

Austrians Retreating
Berlin, via wireless to Sayville, L. I., July 27.—Retirement of Austrian troops south of Leszenow before a superior force of the enemy was announced in the Vienna communique of July 6, telegraphed here today. The war office statement continues:

"Very violent attacks by artillery fire in the vicinity of Radzivilow resulted in insignificant Russian advantages."

"On the Italian front at Valsugana the Italians ceased their attacks, and artillery duels are now going on. On July 4 the enemy's losses before our sector on this front were 1,200 to 1,300 dead and wounded."

He was arrested and brought back to Dallas and lodged in the county bastille awaiting word from army officials at Vancouver. Ray enlisted in the regular army on February 13, of this year and deserted March 13, a little over one month from the time of enlistment.
