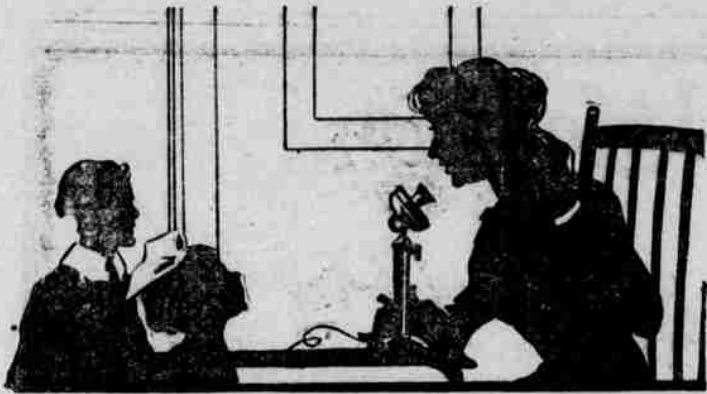

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Jubilee Service to Be Held Tomorrow

Having recently completed an addition to the church, whereby the seating capacity was more than doubled, the members of the Central Congregational church will meet tomorrow evening for a special jubilee service. Special speakers will aid in the program which will consist of short addresses and musical numbers.

The Central Congregational church of Salem for the past few years has been rapidly growing in membership and in attendance, so much so that a few months ago the trustees of the church and active members found it necessary to double the seating capacity.

The church was organized October 7, 1884, by the Rev. P. S. Knight, with 19 members. Of these original members, only two are remaining in the church, Mrs. A. S. Van Patten and Mrs. Clarence Van Patten.

After the organization of the church, a temporary building was erected by the Rev. P. S. Knight, to be used until a more suitable structure could be erected. This building was later furnished for a residence and is now owned by C. H. Rowland, of Portland.

In the early years of the church, Mr. Knight gave his services free as pastor until 1896. The first move towards building a church was made August 3, 1896, when a building 24 by 40 feet was erected, the church building society granting a loan of \$400. The lot for the church cost \$350 and was purchased of Mrs. T. D. Jones, who gave \$70.

Incorporation was in July, 1896, and on August 25, following, the Rev. J. M. Beauchamp was chosen pastor. Rev. U. S. Drake was the next pastor, remaining until December, 1898, when the Rev. T. H. Henderson was called and remained in charge until July, 1902.

Rev. S. P. Knight was again called as pastor, remaining seven years. During his pastorate, a gift from the First Congregational church of what was then their lecture room was accepted, and by a subscription, it was removed and joined to the smaller building, which has since been used as an auditorium.

Through the donation of \$1,000 by the late Mrs. Shannon, the parsonage was built in 1909. The Rev. O. A. Stillman was called as pastor in 1909 following the resignation of Mr. Knight. Mr. Stillman remained as pastor until June 30, 1912, and was succeeded by the Rev. Thomas J. Woodcock, who served as pastor until his death, July 12, 1914.

The present pastor, the Rev. H. C. Stover, was chosen December 1, 1914, and is the present pastor in charge. During the past two years, the membership has grown rapidly, making necessary the addition to the church this summer, more than doubling the seating capacity.

Biblical Pictures Saturday and Sunday

On account of the many inquiries that have come from the people of Salem in regard to the famous Biblical pictures, "From the Manger to the Cross," arrangements have been made to show this picture on Saturday evening as well as on Sunday evening. The doors of the First Congregational church will be opened Saturday and Sunday evenings at seven o'clock. First come first served. The presentation of this magnificent picture to the people of Salem will most appropriately close the series of services, "The one of its kind in Oregon, was inaugurated last October when a series of illustrated talks on the general subject of "The Countries at War." The church was unable to accommodate the crowds that came to hear these addresses and see the pictures. Years before the pastor had heard Dr. Edward Everett Hale one of the most distinguished preachers in America, say "Make your services interesting and people will attend them." In order to make the services interesting a moving picture equipment, one of the best in the city, was installed, and ever since the first Sunday evening in February last when for the first time in Oregon a moving picture machine was used as part of the regular church equipment, the sermons and addresses given in this church on Sunday evening have been illustrated by some of the most beautiful and inspiring pictures ever seen in the city. Capacity congregations have been the rule during these months and time and time again many have been turned away for lack of room. Last Sunday evening mothers brought their little children and blankets and after hugging the babies to sleep laid them gently on the blankets spread in the aisles of the church. The pastor of the church has labored night and day in his efforts to make his church a home for all the people of Salem and his efforts have been well rewarded by the throngs that crowd his evening services. Already plans have been made whereby these Pleasant Sunday Evening services will be more interesting than ever during the coming year.
