CITIES OUTLINE EFFECT

The city. The supplies on hand there now, officials said, would not last any length of time.

New York, being a clearing point for many other cities, could live for weeks until organization of motor transportation could be arranged.

Pittsburg, located on three rivers, might thereby be saved from a real food stringency. City officials there said automobile transportation undoubtedly would figure in relieving the situation.

"Pittsburg has supplies of fresh foods and meats to last about 48 hours and preserved foodstuffs to last about 10 days," said a statistician.

Boston would suffer very little, according to Professor Cunningham, statistician and railroad expert of Harvard, despite the fact that the flour supply there now is low. Boston now has enough butter and eggs in warehouses to last through the winter, but meat would be very scarce, Professor Cunningham said.

Milk Not Important. Interurban trolleys and water facilities would prevent extreme suffering in St. Louis, business men and officials there said.

James Wilson, president of the Wholesale Board of Trade, at San Francisco, said provisions in warehouses there would last probably 30 days, giving ample time for replenishing stocks by water traffic.

Los Angeles feels even more secure than San Francisco, chamber of commerce members declaring the city could hold out from three weeks to three months with some little inconvenience. There are unlimited supplies there of meat, flour and non-perishable produce, it was learned.

The most pessimistic opinion came from Kansas City. The transportation commissioner there said Kansas City could not stand a nation-wide railroad strike 24 hours.

From Denver and St. Paul and Cleveland came opinions that the strike would not be felt, except for lack of milk for from two weeks to a month.

In all cities, however, emphasis was laid on the suffering that would be caused from lack of milk. Many pointed out that the problem of getting coal would be very difficult to solve.

In Kansas City and many other cities officials said a coal shortage would mean no motive power for the thousand one uses to which it is put. Many officials said gasoline shortage for automobiles, etc., would prove a hardship since motor vehicles would be largely dependent on it for bringing foodstuffs from producing centers.

The high wheat price in the east is responsible for the advance on the coast and with \$1 for club in Portland, the price figures out about 88 cents for Salem.

New oats are quoted at 35 cents, and old at 38 and 40.

Cracked corn also advanced to \$42. Eggs continue strong with several stores paying 23 cents. Broilers under two pounds bring 15 cents.

Flour is likely to advance 10 cents a sack next week as the Seattle and Portland millers have pushed the price up 40 cents a barrel. Higher wheat means higher prices for flour.
