ONE WHO KNOWS IT WRITES ABOUT FLAX SOCIETY

Dr. Harry McKay Tells of Early Experience—Is a Flax Enthusiast

This is a story of flax culture in Oregon, written by a man who was born in Ireland, who worked in the flax fields as a youth and who later became interested in the raising of flax in the Willamette valley.

When I first located in Portland over 30 years ago, I noticed the climatic conditions were somewhat similar to those of northern Ireland where I was born. It struck me that flax could be raised in the Willamette valley.

I told them about flax and what it had done for the north of Ireland. Very little progress was made until after the war, and then it was that it had done for the north of Ireland.

When I handed the sample to one of the officials I said, "Give me your opinion on the quality of this flax." After a close examination, he said, "This is 'Cortina' flax."

"In Ireland the seed used is what is called 'Riga' and is sold by grocers in every village. The farmer purchases the seed he needs, it is pulled and retted by the farmers and the retting is done on his own land.

"Mr. Toth, I have written many times to you, but the money some of our Portland mossbacks have as I would not hesitate in risking a fortune on the flax. We can grow the flax without a doubt. Think of how much money is spent for the time for the making of nets on the Columbia river."
