Slight Improvement In Volume and Prices

New York, Aug. 8 - The New York Evening Sun financial review today said: Although operations throughout the list reflected a moderate increase in speculative interest, transactions were light and generally similar in character to those of the recent preceding days, with perhaps, a more decided tendency on the part of traders to restrict their business to quick turns in the more prominent issues. Expectation of a poor government crop report, which was not put out until near the close of business, helped to restrain the making of commitment on either side of the account but the actual figures of the government estimate which were extremely unfavorable, did not result in active selling or important price concessions.

Because of Poison Troops Guard Water

Headquarters California National Guard, Nogales, Ariz., Aug. 8 - California troops were held in readiness today to move to Aravares, 25 miles northward following the dispatch of one troop of Connecticut cavalry to do guard duty there. No explanation of the move was obtainable at headquarters although it was indicated that the sending of troops to that place, where large supplies of food and military stores are kept, was of great importance.

A company of California militiamen are today guarding the Nogales Water company's pumping station. No reason was given for detaining troops to this place. The theft of a large quantity of cyanide of potassium from the El Barto mines, six miles south of Nogales, Sonora, was reported to military authorities just before the troops were ordered to the water plant.

Pardoned So He Could Serve Another Sentence

At the request of the authorities of the state penitentiary, Governor Withycombe today issued a conditional pardon to J. C. Donville, in order that he may be turned over to the federal authorities to begin serving a five year sentence at the federal prison at McNeil's Island, Washington. Donville has had much notoriety lately in connection with his recent trial and conviction for perjury, in the federal court in Portland. Donville was received at the state penitentiary in May, 1915, from Marion county to serve one to five years for obtaining money by false pretense, and has lately been on trial in Portland in the federal court, charged with perjury. He has today been given into the custody of the federal authorities to begin serving his sentence at McNeil's Island.

TILLAMOOK HAS COMPANY

Tillamook, Or., Aug. 8 - With a nucleus of eighty men, the Tenth Coast artillery company, national guard of Oregon, started a recruiting campaign today. Captain Williams and Lieutenant Shipp of the regular army mustered the company in last night. S. S. Johnson, candidate for circuit judge, was elected captain. Assemblyman T. B. Handley was named second lieutenant and R. B. Walls, manager of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company here, first lieutenant.

All Flax Fields Will Be Pulled, Says Board

All flax fields under contract by the state will be pulled. The weeds will be segregated from the flax straw, and the growers will be paid for the actual quantity of flax straw produced. This decision was arrived at by the board of control this morning. The board met this morning for the primary purpose of hearing the report of temporary superintendent Crawford, who has been for several days investigating the flax fields. This report shows that 175 acres of the total now in flax under state contract is very dirty with weeds of various kinds. It is estimated that in these fields weeds predominate to the extent of 75 per cent. The report does not consider these acres worth pulling, but they will be pulled anyway. From 3 per cent to 15 per cent mixed weeds is the estimate given in the report of the balance of 440 1/2 acres. With careful handling most of these weeds can be eliminated. The best of the entire crop is about 78 per cent in length and quality. This is attributed in the report to the late spring and the poor condition of the land at seeding time.
