ESTIMATE MADE OF OREGON'S CROPS

Total For All Crops Will Be Well Above \$35,000,000, Excluding Stock

Labor Commissioner Hoff has issued a statement estimating the value of Oregon's crops for 1916. He places the total value of the 10 principal products at \$31,388,500, as follows:

Corn, \$1,008,000; wheat, \$13,097,230; oats, \$5,412,000; barley, \$2,447,500; potatoes, \$5,000,000; peaches, \$272,000; pears, \$510,000; quinces, \$5,000; rye, \$418,000; apples, \$3,216,000; total, \$31,388,500.

Crop conditions, August 1, with estimates of yield, are thus given by the commissioner:

Corn, 86 per cent; forecast, 1,200,000 bushels from 41,000 acres.

Winter wheat, 86 per cent; forecast, 11,781,000 bushels.

Spring wheat, 86.2 per cent; forecast, 4,000,000 bushels.

Total wheat yield, 15,781,000 bushels. a. 83 cents; value, \$13,097,230.

Stocks of wheat on farms, 873,000 bushels.

Oats, 90.3 per cent; forecast, 13,200,000 bushels; value, \$5,412,000.

Barley, 90 per cent; forecast, 4,450,000 bushels at 35 cents; value, \$2,447,500.

Hay, 88 per cent; forecast, 2.1 tons per acre at \$114.51 per ton.

Potatoes, 92 per cent; forecast, 5,250,000 bushels from 50,500 acres; price 80 cents per bushel, value \$5,000,000.

Rye, 91 per cent; forecast, 418,000 bushels at \$1 per bushel; value, \$418,000.

Apples, 72 per cent; forecast, 3,216,000 boxes at \$1 per box; value, \$3,216,000.

Peaches, 59 per cent; forecast, 372,000 bushels at \$1 per bushel; value, \$372,000.

Pears, 68 per cent; forecast, 510,000 bushels at \$1 per bushel; value, \$510,000.

Grapes, 80 per cent crop. Blackberries, loganberries, etc., 94 per cent crop.
