Good for All Parties. "The extension of the United Press facilities to South America and the bringing of La Nación's news facilities to the United States will be a tremendous benefit on both continents," said Postmaster General Burleson. "It will aid in many material ways. The advantage commercially is readily apparent and the good that will accrue from the increased understanding between the nations should be equally apparent. It is a splendid thing and both parties to the new arrangements are to be congratulated on their enterprise." Senator William J. Stone, chairman of the foreign relations committee, was equally pleased over the news. "The benefit that will result from the establishment of such a news service is readily apparent," said Senator Stone. "It will bring the democracies of the two countries in close touch. We have been hampered in our efforts to become acquainted with one another by the lack of current information regarding one another. We have been more isolated from one another than we have been from the countries of Europe. A splendid thing has been done by La Nación and the United Press in putting an end to this isolation."

The following prices for fruits and vegetables are those asked by the wholesaler of the retailer, and not what is paid to the producer. All other prices are those paid the producer. Corrections are made daily.

Wheat is now quoted at 95 cents and the bakers of the larger cities in the east are talking of making a loaf of bread cost 10 cents. Corn is practically out of the market and quotations are withdrawn. Same with old oats. New oats prices are rather uncertain but the quotation of 35 cents is given. The prediction of \$7.50 a box for lemons has come true as the price touched that notch today. A few months ago they were \$4 a box. Several kinds of hard wheat flour are on the market, but grocers today say the run is between \$1.65 to \$1.80. There is no uniform price on flour as so many grades are on the market. Portland has advanced 40 cents a barrel during the past week.
