Wheat Market Weaker On Eastern Reaction

Portland, Or., Aug. 15. - The excitement that has prevailed in the northwestern wheat market for the past 10 days subsided yesterday, at least temporarily. The 5 cent slump in the Chicago market brought buying to a sudden stop in this territory. Early in the morning offers were out at Saturday's level, but when word came of the downturn in the east the buyers quickly withdrew from the market.

The Chicago break was ascribed mainly to the more serious strike situation. Some of the larger buyers in the northwest, fearing this turn, slowed down in their operations at the close of last week. The bids that were put out yesterday afternoon were revised in line with the new Chicago prices, and the reduction naturally checked offerings by farmers.

There is a difference of opinion as to the amount of wheat that has been sold by northwestern farmers in the past 10 days. Local dealers estimate the quantity anywhere from 10,000,000 to 20,000,000 bushels, and some place it as high as 40 per cent of the crop. It is probable that a few export sales have been made, but by far the larger part of the business was for account of mills in the east.

Hogs Higher There was a good run of hogs at the yards yesterday, but the demand was active and prices were forced up 15 cents, with \$9.90 as the top quotation on prime stock. The bulk of sales were at \$9.70 to \$9.75.

Prune Market Dormant Roseburg, Or., Aug. 15. - That the prune market is dormant at present, with no indication of revival, was the statement made here today by a number of the leading buyers.

Pears Sell Higher Hood River, Or., Aug. 15. - The Fruit Growers' exchange has made an offering of \$1.65 for Bartlett pears. This is the record for pears of this variety. The fruit is late, however, and it is expected by the Apple Growers' association that a sag will occur in prices about the time the Hood River crop matures, because of the simultaneous harvest in other districts. Bartlett's last year for the most part went to canneries at \$20 per ton, approximately 50 cents a box.

Fruit Is Damaged Medford, Or., Aug. 15. - A sudden wind storm struck the Rogue River valley Friday night and in less than half an hour did damage to the pear crop estimated at between \$50,000 and \$75,000.
