LEMBERG, TAKEN AND RECAPTURED AGAIN OBJECT OF RUSSIAN DRIVE



LEMBERG MUNICIPAL THEATER, AND AUSTRIANS CAPTURED BY RUSSIANS

Lemberg, the capital of Galicia, is one of the principal objective points of the present Russian operations against the Germans and Austro-Hungarians, and the Teutons will fight hard before yielding this important city to their enemies. A railroad runs from Brody, recently taken by the Russians, to Lemberg, and the two cities are about fifty miles apart. Lemberg was captured by the Russians on September 2, 1914, and retaken by the Teuton forces in June, 1915. The Russians renamed the city, calling it Lwoff, its ancient Polish name. The city has a population of 200,000 and is an important Austro-Hungarian military station. It was founded in the thirteenth century. Pictures show the municipal theatre in Lemberg and a group of Austrian soldiers captured by the Russians.

GERMANS FORCED

(Continued from Page 1.)

the Somme. The British pushed their lines forward toward Ghinchy, exerting more pressure on the Germans nearly surrounded in Guillemont. The French penetrated the village of Maurepas and increased the danger of Germans clinging to Clery village.

Dispatches from Berlin today reported a deadlock on both the Russian and Italian fronts, though the latest official statements from Petrograd announced gains in the Carpathians. Evidence that both sides in the Balkans are preparing for serious fighting was contained in the announcement that the Bulgarians have crossed the Greek border and occupied a strategic position at the town of Florina, threatening the French right flank.

Hot Fighting at Verdun.
Paris, Aug. 19.—The Germans entered a small element of a French trench north of Maurepas in most violent counter attacks against all the newly won French positions north of the Somme last night, but at every point were completely repulsed, it was officially announced today.

On the Verdun front the French captured a few ruined houses on the outskirts of Fleury village to which the Germans still cling. The German assaults north of the Somme reached their greatest violence between Maurepas and Clery. The Teutons vainly attempted to expel the French from the outskirts of Maurepas and throw back the French lines threatening to encircle the village. They suffered heavy losses under French machine gun fire. The French took 50 prisoners.

South of the Somme artillery was most active in the region of Bellefleur Sauteuse, where the French have advanced their lines and also near Eathese.

The Germans resumed the fighting on the northwestern front of Verdun last night with two grenade attacks against the French salient north of Avocourt and against Hill 304. Both attacks were completely repulsed. The Germans were driven back to their trenches after suffering heavy losses. Artillery was most active on the whole Verdun front.

In Thursday's and Friday's fighting the French captured 300 un wounded prisoners.

Germans Admit Losses.
Berlin, Aug. 19.—Massed Anglo-French forces combined in a tremendous assault on the German lines on the Somme battle front yesterday attacking on a 12 mile front extending eastward from Ovillers.

The war office announced this afternoon that the trenches firmly held by the Germans on both sides of Guillemont were captured but with heavy enemy losses.

At the same time a terrific battle occurred on the northeastern front of Verdun where all French attacks were beaten back excepting in the mountain woods. On that sector trenches which had been destroyed were abandoned to the French.

Russians Still Gaining.
Petrograd, Aug. 19.—Heavy fighting has broken out on the Russian front east of Kovel, after a lull of several days while the Russians pressed their advance in Galicia and near the Carpathians.

The war office today announced that in stubborn fighting along the Stochod river, the czar's troops broke through the Austro-German position and captured the town of Toboly. A considerable advance was scored in this fighting.

In the Pripiet marsh district northeast of Kovel the Russians captured enemy positions west of Lake Nobel, in the Chervische river region.

SALEM USES 300 CARLOADS OF BOTTLES

Glass Factory Located Here Ought To Do Large Business In Northwest

Why wouldn't Salem be a good location for a glass factory? Fully 300 carloads of empty glass were shipped into Salem this year to meet the bottling demand here. Few people here have had any idea of the magnitude of the local demand or realize the amount of money being sent out of the city for products of the glass factories.

Most of these bottles come from the east, since the loganberry juice factories use a high grade bottle, which comes much higher from San Francisco. The only Pacific coast city having a factory. They are compelled to bring the white sand used in the better grade of glass products from Belgium in ballast and their supply has been uncertain since the European war broke out. Zanesville, Ohio, factories probably supply the larger part of the bottles being used in Salem at the present time, and the demand is so great that prices are steadily advancing.

Salem has plenty of sand for the cheaper grade of glass and if the better quality is lacking it could be brought here just as cheaply as the San Francisco factory secures it from Belgium.

This is a field that it might be profitable for the Commercial club to investigate, since the market for glass products is expanding so rapidly in the northwest, and the field will no doubt attract investors soon who will choose some city in this section for their operations.

Playground Committee Sums Up Donations

The playgrounds committee in summing up the donations made for the Albert Park Playground find that citizens have been generous in donating apparatus and material. J. H. Albert's generosity in donating the use of the grounds is highly commendable. The junior high school pupils made a good start by the general clean-up of the grounds. This was supplemented by "Clean-up day" when 25 children assisted. The city donated the use of teams, old lumber and built a stairway down Church street at a cost of all of about \$25. The city further set aside \$250 for the payment of expenses. This was supplemented by donations of private individuals, amounting to \$25—Cornelia Marvin, \$5; Hoyt Wilson, \$5; E. T. Moores, \$5; Chas. H. Jones, \$10; making the total resources in money, \$275. This with a little more will be enough to keep the grounds open until about the middle of September.

No Forest Fires Thanks to the Rain
The smoke which is usually so manifest in the air at this season of the year is entirely lacking, due to late summer rains and the lingering heavy snows of the past winter. Figures gathered by forest conservation interests show that the damage by forest fires in Oregon and Washington this summer amounts to comparatively nothing.

Between January 1 and August 10 on 1249 fires were reported to the United States forest service from the district comprising Oregon, Washington and Alaska. The cost of suppressing these fires amounted to only \$337,90, 211 of them being of no consequence, and but one of the remaining number causing damage of more than \$1000.

For the same period in 1915 there were 370 fires and the cost of fighting them amounted to \$378,74.

Dario Resta Ranks As Favorite Today
Speedway, Maywood, Ill., Aug. 19.—Dario Resta, automobile speed king, ruled the favorite for honors in today's gold cup and \$10,000 prize automobile race.

None of the eight drivers who qualified for the race yesterday came close to the diminutive Italian's record lap of the day before, when he circled the wooden track at a speed of 113.5 miles an hour. As a result Resta will have the pole in the first of the five twenty mile heats. The \$10,000 purse will be divided as follows:

First \$5,000; second \$2,500; third \$1,250; fourth \$750; fifth \$500.
