San Francisco, Aug. 23.-With the pooling of a majority of stock of the Alaska Packers association, the forma-Ansaa Packers association, the forma-tion of a gigantic \$25,000,000 corpora-tion by merging the principal fruit canning companies of the west with the big fish concern is so near a certainty today that Frank B. The merger will enable the new company to keep the Alaska Fish packers large fleet of ships in continuous operation. After the close of salmon packing, it is planned to have these vessels carry the fruit and fish preducts to the east and England via the Panama canal.
