A suit to quiet title was filed in the circuit court this afternoon by Delilah A. Goode against Stephen M. Cole, Lydia Cole, August Scherberger, Mattie A. Parrish, Josie L. Stewart, Fred S. Stewart, Grace G. Stevens, Edward A. Stevens, Henrietta Parrish, Halie Parrish Hinges and others. Plaintiff claims ownership to land commencing at a point on the north side of Market street 127.54 feet east of the southwest corner of a tract of land lying south of block 7, North Salem; thence north parallel with Winter street 110 feet; thence east parallel with Market street 50 feet; thence south parallel with Winter street 110 feet; thence west 50 feet to place of beginning, located in the Josiah L. Parrish land claim in the city of Salem. The complaint alleges that defendants claim some title in property, which title is denied by plaintiff, and she asks a decree that defendants be permanently enjoined and restrained from exerting any right, title or interest in and to the premises.
