CONGRESS WILL

(Continued from Page One.) "The railroad brotherhood leaders were unable this afternoon to give the president any assurance." The president immediately arranged to meet throughout the morning tomorrow with congressmen and senators at the capitol. He will go to the capitol early and is expected to remain there until a short time before his train leaves for Long Branch, N. J. The legislation drafted for introduction this afternoon and passage tomorrow by house leaders and now said to have President Wilson's approval, is as follows: An eight hour day for railroaders effective December 1. Payment for overtime at a pro rata rate and not at time and a half. Appointment of a commission of three to investigate the effect of the eight hour day and report to congress. Provision that railroad officials guilty of causing an employe to work more than eight hours except in case of extreme necessity, shall be punished by fines and imprisonment, or both. An appropriation of \$25,000 for the expenses of the investigating committee. President Urges Action. Washington, Aug. 31.—Continuing his driving tactics to force congressional action that will avert the threatened railroad strike, President Wilson today again swung his executive whip over the senate and leaders. Appearing in person at the capitol, he told members that information was at hand showing a strike could be prevented by immediate action on the eight hour proposal suggested to the joint session of congress Tuesday. He requested hearings be speeded up as much as possible, and that action on his measure, together with passage of legislation covering the application of the eight hour day to railroad operation, be pushed through by Saturday. Thirty Thousand Trout Planted Near Mt. Hood

Portland, Or., Aug. 31.—Thirty thousand steelhead fingerlings, from the State rearing ponds at Bull Run, Oregon, have just been placed in five different lakes in the Mt. Hood and Mt. Jefferson regions, on the Oregon National Forest. This difficult work, as done by the State of Oregon, the forest service, and the Portland railway light & power company in co-operation, and required seven days to complete. An auto truck, furnished by the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, and driven by O. C. Graves, covered the 250 miles in making the trip from Portland to the accessible points nearest the lakes. Fifteen thousand of the fish were carried in the first load to the end of the road sixty miles from Bull Run. This point was reached at eleven o'clock at night. This was the first time an auto truck ever made a 32-mile trip between Government camp and Clackamas Lake. Here the fish were held overnight, constantly attended by four men, who kept the water thoroughly aerated. The next morning the cans were placed on fourteen pack animals, in charge of Rangers Dec Wright, Joe Graham, and Hiram A. Wilcox, and conveyed the 24 miles to Lakes Monun and Ollalie, where the fish were placed in the water. No stops were made on this trip. These lakes belong to a group of 6 lakes in the Mt. Jefferson region, and can be seen from the summit of Hallie mountain. The truck returned to Bull Run and

Weekly Report of Union Stock Yards

Portland, Or., Aug. 31.—Cattle—There was a good run of cattle here yesterday, 1150 head. Cows were in very good demand and prices were 15 to 25 cents higher. There was a very liberal offering of steers and they found a slow sale. Prices were 15 to 25 cents lower. Prime heavy steers sold at \$9.75 which was 25c under last weeks top. The bulk of steers sold \$8 and \$5.50. Quality not being as good as a week ago. Cows were of very good quality. As a rule the bulk selling over the 5c mark. There were a number of loads sold a \$5.35 and \$5.40 bulls and calves sold steady. Hogs—The hog supply was rather limited yesterday. 1800 head started the days trading. There was a fairly good demand from all buyers and a brisk trade ruled. Prices were steady to a dime higher. Top sold at \$9.85 with the bulk of sales \$9.75 and \$9.85. Yesterday sheep house trading was confined to a couple of loads of lambs. They were fairly good stuff and crossed the scales at \$8.00. All classes of sheep are in good demand. The choice grade of lambs are quoted \$8 and \$8.25 best yearlings \$8.50 and prime light ewes \$5.25 and \$5.50.
