Hop Crop Will Be Short Much Mold In Evidence

The hop situation may be summed up in a few words. There is much mold, and the crop is going to be short. Picking has begun in practically all the yards. In the Independence district it is reported that many pickers have failed to show up, and a call has been sent out for more pickers. Fuggles, which comprise but a small portion of the whole crop, have all been picked. Most reports are that they have turned out well and are of good quality. Stories continue to come of growers who have decided to abandon their yards. The new dryer at the Livelys yards south of town has been giving some trouble, and it has been found necessary to take some of the hops from the Livelys yards to other dryers, but the difficulty seems to have been remedied and the new drying plant, it is stated, is doing from two to three times the work heretofore accomplished with the old style dryers. Hit by Shell Fragment, French Canadian Loses Use of Mother Tongue



Colonel C. J. Mersereau, a French Canadian who went with the first contingent sent by Canada to the front, spoke French and a little English. He has returned knowing no French, but still retaining the power to speak English. At the second battle of Ypres he was struck by a fragment of a shell on the head. He was operated on and lay in the hospital three months, with but little hope of recovery. He finally pulled through, but without the power of understanding any language but English.

Medical Society Has Session at McMinnville

McMinnville, Or., Sept. 7. - The Polk-Yamhill, Marion Medical society met in this city Tuesday night, with a large number of doctors of the three counties in attendance. After enjoying a banquet at the Hotel Elberton, at which many of the wives also were present, they went to the rooms of the Commercial club to discuss subjects of interest to the profession.

Dr. McIntyre of Salem read a paper on anesthesia, and after a brief discussion from the floor, the doctors unanimously indorsed ether as the safest anesthetic.

How to handle the feeble minded was the subject of a paper by Dr. Smith, superintendent of the Feeble Minded institution of Salem. Dr. Smith spoke in favor of segregation and detention of all feeble minded persons, under proper supervision. This, he said, would give them a chance to become partially self supporting under surrounding agreeable to themselves and would prevent the propagation of 80 per cent of the feeble minded persons. If the present system of intermarriage of feeble minded people is allowed to continue, their support, he contended, will soon become an impossible burden to the state.

NEW YORK HAVING Riot Reports Unfounded

At police headquarters today it was asserted that all reports of brick throwing and near rioting received from the Interborough company had proved to be unfounded. Five thousand police were on strike duty today. From two to four uniformed officers were assigned to every subway and elevated station in town. On the subway a policeman was on guard at the underground stations on both the up-town and down-town sides. All subways and elevated trains were equipped with special guards to guard motormen from injury in case of attack.

President Theodore P. Shonts of the Interborough company claimed early today that normal service was being maintained on both the subway and elevated system. Upwards of five thousand strikebreakers were housed in various barns of the companies which had been converted into barracks.

Trains were in operation throughout the night, but toward early morning train service became intermittent. The strike was called shortly after 9 o'clock and from then on until today it was evident that the regular men were gradually leaving their posts.

Interborough officials have flatly refused to arbitrate the differences with the employees. The men struck because of the refusal of General Manager Hedley to abrogate individual "master and servant" contracts made with hundreds of employees after the recent troubles when a strike was narrowly averted.

Mayor Mitchell is expected to reach town tonight but both union leaders and company officials declare intervention by the mayor will be useless. Both sides seemed determined to fight it out to a finish.

Strike leaders claimed early today that fifty per cent of the subway and elevated employees had already quit. They asserted that by tonight the power houses of both systems will be closed down and that the tie up will then be complete.

Issue N. Sullivan for the nomination for justice of the state supreme court was indicated today in late returns from Tuesday's primary. Robert N. Dunn and John C. Rice received the non-partisan nominations for the office.

A strong fight against Sullivan was made by the progressives because of a contempt case in 1913, in which the publisher and editor of the Boise Capital-News were sentenced to jail for contempt, it being charged that they published an attack by Colonel Theodore Roosevelt on the Idaho supreme court.

Roosevelt criticized the court after it barred progressive electors from the ballot.

There seems to be a general feeling that wheat is up for good and that high prices may be looked for, although there was a slight decline on the Chicago market today on account of the general belief that Greece would enter the war. Everything that tends towards opening the Danubian has a depressing effect on wheat. Growers are selling cane sugar for \$7.35 and beet sugar at \$7.15. Even at these lower prices stocks are not heavy as there is a general feeling that another reduction will be announced within a few days. The live stock market is steady at prevailing prices.
