Brundage, L. A. Hoskins, Edwin T. Earl, Colonel William H. Barry, Martin F. Bethouss, president of the council; Councilmen Langdon, Brain, Roberts, Wheeler, Toppan, Wright; L. Handley, president of the board of public works; Owen McAlee, member of the board of public works; Henry A. Frazier, Robert M. Allen, John Doe and Richard Roe.

Henry Frazier, a newspaper reporter, struck City Councilman Wright on the jaw with his fist. "It was only a joke," said Wright. Frazier is the second newspaper man to strike a city official within a month.
