State House News

Attorney General Brown has rendered an opinion that the recent action of the republican central committee of Multnomah, Clackamas and Columbia counties in nominating E. E. Covert as district, to succeed George M. McBride resigned, is invalid. The committee held a convention recently in Portland to nominate Covert, with a view to having his name appear on the ballot as the republican candidate, he having been already nominated as an independent candidate. The attorney general holds that the central committee of a party can only fill vacancies occurring through death or removal from the electoral district, and not otherwise. It is stated that neither condition existed in the Covert case.

The Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company has filed its annual report with the public service commission. The total operating revenue of the company for the year are shown as being \$19,477,308.84, and the total operating expenses as \$13,850,061.51, making a total net operating revenue of \$5,627,247.33. The sum of \$158,263.63 was transferred to the corporate surplus during the year.

Official Pamphlets Mailed to Voters

The official pamphlets containing the proposed constitutional amendments and measures, with arguments submitted respecting the same, referred to the people at the coming general election November 7, 1916, are now being mailed from Portland to the registered voters of the state by Secretary of State Olcott. The printing and binding of these pamphlets is being done by a Portland printing house under contract - they being the lowest bidders. Up to September 6th some 46,000 pamphlets had been mailed covering all the registered voters of Baker, Benton Clackamas, Clatsop, Columbia, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Gilliam, Grant and Hood River counties. The mailing to the balance of the counties of the state will be completed by September 13th.

Prior to the general election in November 1914, 305,900 voters registered in Oregon. For the general election occurring in November 1916 only 250,000 voters have registered so far. Unless there has been a very material decrease in the number of voters in Oregon since the last general election, some 55,000 of them have so far neglected to register. Ordinarily the increase in registration is from 15 to 25 per cent every two years and allowing for a 1916 increase at the same rate there should be at least 350,000 voters registering for the coming November election. Books of registration close October 7th so that but one month remains within which voters may register for the ensuing general election.

Another matter to which Secretary Olcott directs attention is that the official election pamphlets are forwarded only to registered voters. Any unregistered voter to insure himself or herself a pamphlet, should immediately register before the county clerk of his or her county. Prior registration laws authorized the county clerks to accept registrations up to 15 days before an election, but the permanent registration law enacted by the 1915 legislative assembly provides for closing the registration books for a period of 30 days before each general election.

Picking the Place for Rural Credit Bank

San Francisco, Sept. 11. - Members of the federal farm loan board are today hearing more reasons why California should be the state chosen for one of the twelve banks to be established under the federal rural credit law. Representatives of farmers clubs in California city, state and federal officials, members of the State Commission on Land Colonization and Rural Credits and financiers are giving the board facts and figures regarding California's agricultural development, and its future, if assured long time loans for farmers at low interest.

Polk Gains From Bad Bridge.

One benefit accruing to Polk county from the bad condition of the Polk-Marion bridge is being felt by the warehousemen at Airie and McCoy. Farmers from the top of the hill and the side of the mountain are hauling their grain this year to McCoy and Airie instead of across the bridge to Salem. Dallas Observer.

Walla Walla Farmers See Wheat at \$1.36

Walla Walla, Wash., Sept. 11. - Wheat was active here yesterday, and today farmers, enticed by the highest prices since wheat sold at \$1.50, disposed of more than 200,000 bushels. As high as \$1.36 was paid for Turkey red wheat by millers, but the prevailing prices were \$1.34 1/2 and \$1.35, with bluestem 3 cents lower and club bringing around \$1.26.

Mrs. A. R. Neff sold 40,000 bushels of last year's turkey red to Owsley & Case for \$1.34; Dement Bros. bought for the same price a large lot of the Smith Sexton wheat; James Lyons sold between 15,000 and 20,000 bushels of club to Jones Scott company for about \$1.26 1/2; Joe Ed Painter sold to the Preston Shaffer Milling company, of Waitsburg, a good sized lot of bluestem for about \$1.32 1/2; H. P. Wheeler sold about 20,000 bushels of bluestem for about \$1.32 1/2, and it was reported J. J. Managan sold about 25,000 bushels of club.

Grass and Timber Fire In San Jose Foothills

San Jose, Sept. 11. - A 7:30 a. m. today the grass and forest fires which is sweeping the foothills west of Santa Cruz mountain was within three quarters of a mile from the summer home of Mayor James Rolph of San Francisco and was burning over his property. The flames were still seriously menacing C. H. Fletcher's ranch but in other sections were well under control.

Several hundred men were battling the blaze on the Rolph ranch and it was expected that it would be checked before reaching the San Francisco mayor's house. Carl Staugen, employed on a summer estate at Portola last the life battling the flames Sunday, a sudden burst of flame overcame him and causing his death before he could be rescued. There were several narrow escapes.
