Official Pamphlets Mailed to Voters

The official pamphlets containing * constitutional amend the proposed ments and measures, with arguments submitted respecting the same, referred to the people at the coming gen-eral election November 7, 1916, are now being mailed from Portland to the registered voters of the state by Secretary of State Olcott. The print-Secretary or State Geost. The print-ing and binding of these pamphiets is being done by a Portland printing house under contract—they being the lowest bidders. Up to September 6th some 46,000 pamphlets had been mailed covering all the registered voters of Pakker Renton Chalannes Christo Co. Baker, Benton Clackamas, Clatsop, Co-lumbia, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Gilliam, Grant and Hood River counties. The mailing to the balance of the counties of the state will be completed by Sepember 13th.

Prior to the general election in No-vember 1914, 305,000 voters registered in Oregon. For the general election occurring in November 1916 only 250, 000 voters have registered so far. Another matter to which Secretar Olcott directs attention is that the of ficial election pamphlets are forwards only to registered voters. Any unregi-tered voter to insure himself or he self a pamphlet, should immediately register before the county clerk of his or her county. Prior registration law authorized the county clerks to accep-registrations up to 15 days before ar election, but the permanent registra-tion law enacted by the 1945 legisla tive assembly provides for closing th registration books for a period of 3 days before each general election.
