

Board Refused to Take Care of Flax

As briefly announced yesterday, the emergency board at its meeting yester-day refused to declare a deficiency in the state flax department, and as a consequence the board of control is conconsequence the boaru of control is con-fronted with the problem of financing this year's crop. An effort will be made to obtain the money today, with the un-derstanding that the board will go be-fore the legislature and ask for an ap-propriation covering the deficit. Pend-ing arrangements along this line, the farmers will have to wait for their mon-ey.

The board allowed the request for \$25,000 additional for maintenance of the penitentiary, \$10,000 for the boys' training school, \$6,000 for the tubercu-losis hospital, and \$3,000 for the extra-
