Former Governor Cole Blease, by approximately five thousand majority. A heavy vote was polled. F. H. Dominic seems to have unseated representative Wyatt Aitken in the Third district.

### Hunt for Third Term.

Phoenix, Ariz., Sept. 13.—His renomination assured by a majority of more than 3,000, Governor George Hunt, democrat, started his campaign for a third term today. He has the support of organized labor. The nominations for United States senator went to Henry Ashurst, democrat, and Joseph Kibbey, republican; for congress, Carl Hayden, democrat, and Henry Eads, republican.

### Page Wins in Vermont.

Burlington, Vermont, Sept. 13.—Reports from a little more than half the total number of voting precincts early

today give Carroll S. Page a plurality of about 500 for the republican nomination for United States Senator. Governor C. S. Gates of Franklin and former Governor Allan M. Fletcher of Cavendish, were running against him.

### Leo Frank the Issue.

Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 13.—Having fought the Frank case over again at the polls, Georgia has virtually named Hugh M. Dorsey her next governor. Dorsey, who successfully prosecuted Frank on the charge of murdering Mary Phagan and resisted every attempt to have the jury's verdict overturned was nominated by the democratic primary over Governor Nat E. Harris, returns today showed. His popular majority will reach 30,000 and he will have 255 votes in the state convention where 191 are required to nominate.

In the course of his campaign Dorsey made a great deal of the allegation that friends of Frank and various Jewish societies outside of the state were endeavoring to accomplish his defeat. He alleged the existence of a shush fund, though his charges were repudiated by organizations he accused.

### Leo Frank's Prosecutor.

Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 13.—Hugh M. Dorsey, Atlanta, prosecutor of Leo M. Frank, apparently swept the state in the democratic primaries for the gubernatorial nomination. Estimates from 108 counties out of 158 give Dorsey 35,000; Governor Harris 22,000; Dr. L. G. Hardeman 8,000 and Joseph E. Potte 3,000.
