Roller oats are now quoted at \$28.50, bran at \$20, and shorts at \$31. Country butter is bringing from 25 to 27 cents a pound according to quality.

The prediction of lower sugar was all wrong as the market advanced 15 cents a hundred this morning. When the radical drop of 75 cents a hundred was announced last week, many dealers thought it was just the beginning of several declines. But it seems the thought was all wrong, as now there is an upward tendency.

Flour is also up, with five cents a sack tacked on to yesterday's prices. The grocers are paying 26 and 27 cents for eggs and retailing at 30, all which seems to show that the ultimate consumer gets something once in a while without leaving the dealer much of a margin.

Weekly Report of Union Stock Yards

North Portland, Ore., Sept. 12. - Cattle. - Fewer cattle arrived at the yards Monday than for some time. Only 550 head were graded. Feeder buyers were not plentiful. Top reached for the best steers was \$7.51 with the bulk ranging from \$6.25 to \$6.75. Cows sold as high as \$5.40 with the bulk close to that figure. A few heifers sold at \$6.25 with the bulk at \$5.35 to \$5.85. Bulls did not sell over \$3.85 and calves over \$6.25.

Hogs. Buyers did not have more than 2,100 head to select from. The best hogs brought \$9.80 with the bulk at \$9.65 to \$9.75.

Sheep. Lambs sold \$8 to \$8.25 for the best with some going at \$7.90. Yearlings \$6.50 for the tops and a few at \$6.25. Ewes at \$5 and wethers at \$5.75. Receipts were light.

Arrangements Made to Take Care of the Flax

Owing to the action of the emergency board Monday in refusing to create a deficiency in the state flax department, recourse has been taken to the method of handling deficiencies, which was in vogue before the emergency board system was inaugurated. State Treasurer Kay, for the board of control, made arrangements yesterday afternoon with the Ladd & Bush bank by which the bank will cash certificates of indebtedness against the flax department, the certificates being assigned to the bank and the state paying six per cent interest. Between \$12,000 and \$15,000 will be required. The arrangement was made with the understanding that the matter will be put up to the legislature, and it is the opinion of Treasurer Kay that there is little likelihood of the appropriation being denied. However, if the legislature should refuse to appropriate the money, there will be sufficient money from the sale of the flax products to meet the deficiency, although the products will probably not be ready for market by the time the legislature meets.

GERMANS' THIRE LINE

(Continued From Page One.) dispatch to the Evening News today. Attempt a Failure. Petrograd, Sept. 13. - The Austro-Germans made unsuccessful attempts yesterday to take the offensive on the Halitz front by crossing the Bistrizza river near Jezupol, it was officially announced today. In the Carpathians, the enemy made several vain attacks on heights recently captured by the Russians in the upper course of the Czary-Gzeremosz river. The Russian fleet successfully bombarded enemy trawlers in Irben straits.

Russians Ripped

Berlin, Sept. 13. - Russian attacks between Smolence and the Golden Bistritz river (Bukowian frontier) were repulsed with heavy losses, it was officially announced this afternoon.

No Change on British Front.

London, Sept. 13. - The situation on the British front as the result of last night's operations is unchanged, General Haig reported today.

Bulgarians Won First Fight.

Berlin, Sept. 13. - In the first encounter between Bulgarian and Italian troops of the present war, two Italian companies were defeated near Butkatzodomy and 30 prisoners taken by the Bulgars, said an official statement from Sofia today.

Bulgarians Advance in Rumania.

London, Sept. 13. - The Bulgarians have occupied the entire city of Kavalla, taking as prisoners part of the Greek garrison, said a Reuter dispatch from Rome this evening, quoting Austrian sources as authority.
