London, Sept. 13.—The Greek cabinet crisis took a new turn today after King Constantine had accepted the resignation of Premier Zaimis, said a Central News dispatch from Athens to night.

Zaimis finally yielded to persuasions of his friends and withdrew the resignation with the king's consent. He will reform the cabinet with new ministers of war and interior, possibly of pro-ally sympathies.

As a special feature, the Scandinavian male chorus of 50 voices from Portland will take part in the afternoon's program.

Eggs are gradually climbing to a higher notch and it won't be long until they take on an extra five cents a dozen. And in addition to all this, high top shoes are worth a dollar more than one year ago.

It begins to appear that there will be considerable rivalry for offices under the city government at the coming primary. Five candidates are already announced for the office of city recorder—A. M. Dalrymple, Earl Race, H. W. Elgin, Benjamin Via and J. W. Cox. For the office of chief of police three names are mentioned—the present chief, J. T. Welsh, E. E. Cooper and Frank Shedeck. City Treasurer Rice up to this time has no opposition. And so far as the office of mayor is concerned, there is a dead silence.

Ed Johnson, a resident of Silverton, was brought to Salem yesterday and after an examination as to his sanity was committed by County Judge Bushy to the state asylum. It is stated that Johnson's insanity appears to be the result of attending meetings at which a wandering negro preacher has been exhorting the people of Silverton recently. A warrant was sworn out for the arrest of the negro by District Attorney Ringo yesterday afternoon. The warrant was issued on complaint of a number of Silverton people, who charge the revivalist with the use of obscene and abusive language.

Reports from Camp Withycombe rather indicate that members of Company M do not especially like the six year enlistment for those who remain in the company. According to Captain Rosenberg of the Auxiliary of the Salem Rifle club, the federal service situation is about like this: When the regular federal oath was taken at Camp Withycombe before going south, this annulled any previous oath taken as a national guardsman. This oath was for three years or during the war and made the soldiers part of the regular army. When the company is mustered out, those who do not take the federal national guard oath for six years, are freed from all service for the state or nation. Taking the new oath is the same as re-enlisting and of course those who do not re-enlist, are entirely out of military service.
