Judge Belt's Party Bag Some Big Game

Dallas, Oregon, September 16.—Circuit Judge H. H. Belt, Attorney J. R. Sibley and John Miller returned Thursday afternoon from their hunting trip to the headwaters of the Little Nestucca. On Monday they succeeded in bagging a big bear and Tuesday morning Mr. Sibley killed a big five prong buck that weighed over 200 pounds. Mr. Sibley will have the head and horns of the deer mounted.

Sidewalk Contract Finished.
Barham & Company, who have had the contract for constructing several thousand feet of concrete sidewalk for the city finished the contract Wednesday by laying the first stretch of walk at the corner of Washington and Lyle streets. Dallas now has a couple of miles of fine cement walks and it is the plan of the council to have a large amount of walk put down next year. The cement district will also probably be extended next year which will add to the neat appearance of the town.
