were as high as \$10,000. Only one was as low as \$500. But the biggest money was made in New York and Philadelphia.

Detectives arrested the supposed blackmailers by taking possession of the apartment house where they were staying early Sunday. One detective operated the switchboard and listened to all conversations. Dictographs were placed in rooms of suspects. They waited until most of those wanted were in their rooms and then swooped down.

Goods Found On Them. H. G. Clabaugh, government agent, ordered the arrest of a May Traub in St. Louis. In the rooms of the band were scores of pictures of men and women in unconventional poses. These were to be used as evidence to demand money from the persons trapped.

Clabaugh outlined the working of the alleged blackmailers as follows: "Suppose you were president of a nationally known bank. Suppose you had two daughters prominently known in society and club circles. Suppose your wife was a social leader. Then suppose that you had met an attractive and charming woman, say at a roof garden. She flirted with you. Then you called. Then suppose two or three men who said they were government officials, discovered you in a compromising situation and threatened you with exposure, publicity and a prison sentence. Don't you think you would be willing to pay a good sum to have the matter kept quiet?" Silk underwear, expensive furs, rich gowns, seized in the raid were said to be part of the women's equipment for these operations.

boast he would shoot "grito" in the streets of Chihuahua City. Military men here declare his only object was to make a smashing attack and then withdraw.

Villa's attack on Chihuahua injects new issues into the Mexican situation, and it is generally believed, will add months to the stay of the American punitive expedition on Mexican soil and the national guard on the border. With the bandit leader and two thousand men fully armed and equipped, only 200 miles from the border and within a hundred miles of Pershing's forces, authorities declare the administration does not dare withdraw either the expedition from Mexico or the militia from the border.

1500 Carranzas Desert El Paso, Texas, Sept. 18.—Fifteen hundred Carranza soldiers joined Pancho Villa on his retreat from Chihuahua City, following the bandit attack on the city Saturday, according to a reliable report made today to General George Bell, Jr., American commander here.

Reports of United States secret service agents sent to Washington today state that the Chihuahua City attack Saturday was a victory for Villa and that he had accomplished all his objects.

PICTURESQUE FIGURE OF CIVIL WAR PASSER

General Duke Second In Command to Morgan the Great Raider

New York, Sept. 16.—Brigadier General Basil Wilson Duke, confederate veteran, died here today. General Duke was 76 years of age. He was born in Kentucky and was well known as a lawyer in Louisville.

He was the author of many books on the Civil war. General Duke suffered an infection of the foot while visiting his daughter here recently. He was taken to the Presbyterian hospital, where he was operated on. It later became necessary to remove his leg at the knee. The shock of the operation was too severe for him to withstand.

Basil W. Duke was second in command of the famous Morgan cavalry of Kentucky. When Captain John H. Morgan formed his first company at the outbreak of the Civil war, Duke was first lieutenant. As the command grew, Duke rose in rank along with Morgan. He was Morgan's main reliance in the raids into Indiana and Ohio and won fame that placed him among the leaders of the Sons of the Confederacy.

President Roosevelt appointed him as one of the trustees of Chickamauga National Park, a position he held at the time of his death. He is survived by several daughters and one son, Calvin Morgan Duke, of Louisville. His wife, who died several years ago, was General Morgan's sister.

General Duke was one of the very last of the fighting generals of the confederacy and was Kentucky's most prominent veteran.

Children Interested in Industrial Club Work

In a report to superintendent of public instruction J. A. Churchill, L. P. Harrington, industrial field worker, says that the interest in the children's industrial club work in Douglas county is better this year than ever before. At the county fair, which has just been held at Roseburg, the school girls had hundreds of cans of fruit which were entered in the canning contest, besides many exhibits of sewing and baking. Daily demonstrations in canning were given by the girls' teams from Roseburg, Riddle, Yoncalla and other towns of the county. The boys did equally as well in their poultry raising and pig feeding contests. The winner in the rural home beautification project, which has been emphasized this year in Douglas county, was won by Leslie Butner, a fifteen year old boy who lives near Roseburg.

Mr. Harrington reports that the boys and girls exhibits in all of the fourteen projects which are open to children, and that the best display will be sent to Salem and exhibited at the state fair. The two boys and two girls who won the capital prizes will be sent to the state fair and have their traveling expenses paid by the county.
