COOVERT'S NAME WILL NOT BE ON THE BALLOT

Supreme Court Sustains Secretary Olcott—Committee Cannot Act

The name of E. E. Coovert will not be put on the ballot for the next general election as the republican candidate for senator from the Fourteenth district, which comprises the counties of Multnomah, Clackamas and Columbia.

It is stated in the opinion, which was written by Justice Harris, that the direct primary nominating election law provides for the election of precinct committees and then specifies the powers which they can exercise, and consequently no power can be exercised by them unless it is granted by statute.

State Engineer Lewis Wants New Road Laws. State Engineer Lewis has issued a statement in which he advocates a general overhauling of the road laws of the state. He points out that the counties of the state are expending from \$4,000,000 to \$6,000,000 every year on about 37,000 miles of road. This money is expended by 105 county judges and commissioners, 35 county surveyors, four roadmasters, 862 road supervisors and the highway commission. There is no organization or definite system in the matter.
