### State Engineer Lewis Wants New Road Laws

State Engineer Lewis has issued a statement in which he advocates a general overhauling of the road laws of the state. He points out that the counties of the state are expending from \$4,000,000 to \$6,000,000 every year on about 37,000 miles of road. This money is expended by 105 county judges and commissioners, 35 county surveyors, four roadmasters, 862 road supervisors and the highway commission. There is no organization or definite system in

the matter.
"We must have a definite plan en over and maintained as a state road at the expense of the state, the county or over and maintained at the county at the expense of the state, the county to care for such a road prior to its becoming a state road. The main county roads should be built and maintained under the general direction of the county ty courts. These roads will serve as feeders to the main or trunk lines which will carry the concentrated traffic. The will carry the concentrated traffic. It is stated in the opinion, which was written by Justice Harris, that the direct primary nominating elections law provides for the election of precinct committeemen and then specifies the powers which they can exercise, and consequently no power can be exercised by them unless it is granted by statute.

The statute must be taken as it is written, says Justice Harris, regardless of its results; and if there is need for enlarging the powers of precinct committeemen the right to enlarge the authority of party representatives is exercisable by the legislative and not by the judicial department.
