OREGON CAPITALIST DEAD

Sutherlin, Ore., Sept. 19.—J. E. Luse president of the J. E. Luse Land company of Sutherlin and ex-president of the Luse Land & Development company of St. Paul, fell to the sidewalk dead from apoplexy while trying to catch the train from here to Portland shortly before midnight Saturday night.

Mr. Luse was born in Johnson county, Iowa, in 1861. In 1892 he began buying and selling Canada wheat land and for several years was employed as a land salesman for the Canadian Pacific railroad.

The Luse Land & Development company was organized at St. Paul in 1906 and the company is estimated to have sold more than 1,000,000 acres of farm land in the provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta.

Mr. Luse located at Sutherlin in 1909 buying approximately 8000 acres of land. The J. E. Luse company, of Sutherlin, under Mr. Luse, has spent a large fortune in developing the valley and town of Sutherlin.

The funeral was held here today and the body sent to Portland for burial. Mr. Luse was a member of the Elks and Odd Fellows lodges. He is survived by a widow and mother, three brothers, three sisters, a son, Samuel Luse, who resides at Luse, La Grange, Saskatchewan, and one daughter, Mrs. Nellie Seegar, who lives at St. Paul.

RUSSIANS ON SOMME

(Continued from Page One.)

surrendered trenches to the British east of Ghinchy and north of Combles, but have repulsed French attacks near Belloy and Vervandovillers south of the Somme. It was officially announced today.

A French attack on the western slope of Dead Man's hill, northwest of Verdun penetrated German trenches.

Allies Don't Like Him. Athens, Sept. 19.—Foreign Minister Carapanos has received the congratulatory visits of all the diplomats in Athens, except those of the allies.

This is the first dispatch to pass the Anglo-French censorship at Athens, showing that the allies are not pleased with the new Greek foreign minister.

Rain Halts British. London, Sept. 19.—A steady down-pour of rain has halted the British operations on the Somme front and there has been no important fighting since yesterday.

General Haig reported this afternoon that British troops entered enemy trenches at Richebourg La Riviere at three separate places, taking prisoners and inflicting casualties.

Two British Steamers Sunk. London, Sept. 19.—The British steamers Dewa and Lord Tredegar have been sunk.

The Dewa displaced 3,802 tons and was 300 feet long. She was registered at London. The Lord Tredegar displaced 3,856 tons and was 385 feet long. She was registered at Newport.

Italians and Bulgars At It. Paris, Sept. 19.—A most violent battle is going on between the Italians and Bulgarians east of Beles mountains in Macedonia, said an official statement issued here today. On the Vretnik sector, Serbian artillery repulsed two Bulgarian counter attacks.

Repulsed All Attacks. Sofia, Sept. 19.—The repulse of all allied attacks around the Greek town of Florina was announced by the Bulgarian war office today.

Bulgarian troops are continuing their advance against the Rumanians in Dobruja and have captured the Black port of Mangalia, 25 miles south of Constantza.

Governor Pardons Alexander Dranges

Governor Withycombe today issued a conditional pardon to Alexander Dranges, who has been serving a sentence in the Multnomah county jail.

Dranges was sentenced to serve one year in the county jail of Multnomah county on March 17, 1916, for assault with a dangerous weapon.

Dranges was successful in the land allotments at Colville, Washington, last spring, and as he has to make a selection before September 28, he was released at this time in order that he might look out for his interests.

His pardon was recommended by Circuit Judge Robert G. Morrow, before whom he was tried, and Deputy District Attorney John A. Collier connected with his prosecution. The pardon is conditional upon his leaving the state of Oregon immediately upon his release from the Multnomah county jail, and henceforth remaining outside of the boundaries of this state.

Roosevelt Comes Out in Support of Bacon

New York, Sept. 18.—Guns of both the democratic and republican parties were turned for the progressive support in tomorrow's state primaries.

Governor Charles S. Whitman, candidate for the republican nomination, and Judge Samuel Seabury, candidate for the democratic nomination were both in New York conferring with progressive leaders and carrying the fight for progressive support up to the last hour.

Germany's Jabberwok Market Hits the Skids

(By United Press) London, Sept. 1.—(By mail)—Germany's jabberwok market has hit the skids.

The birds and the beasts were there when General Smuts grabbed most of German East Africa and the kaiser's colonialists fled.

A blood sweating behemoth doesn't give a darn what flag flies on his hunting ground. Neither does a fish dash or a whiffenpoof or a man cutting piffik.

No Germany is cut off from her zoological supply.

The first shipment of animals is here from the new British territory today, consigned to E. H. Bostock.

Twenty five baboons goose-stepped at least about the docks with still a shadow of German accent in their chatter. Six porcupines with fixed bayonets held a small hollow square and 400 birds screeched while a pair of secretary birds made notes for reference.

"The Germans will never regain their animal trade," said Bostock today.

Wheat Prices Feel Effect of Competition

Chicago, Sept. 19.—Wheat prices remained down today due to lower foreign prices caused by freer shipments from India and Australia.

Argentina wheat prices. September wheat was unchanged over the low opening down 1-4 at \$1.47 3/4; May down quarter at \$1.48 3/4.

Corn for December and May showed a slight upward trend, while September wheat was quarter below the opening at \$0.12; December 1-4 and May quarter at 7 1/8.

Oats attracted little interest, September remaining unchanged at 44 5/8; December down 1-8 at 47 1/2; and May up quarter at 50 5/8.

Provisions remained firm.

Suggests Officials Be Sentenced to Jail

San Francisco, Sept. 19.—Will Mayor James Roth, Jr., and the 18 members of the board of supervisors have to go to jail for a city debt? Supervisor Walsh stated today that this may be possible, as the officials are cited to appear before Superior Judge Seawell Friday to show why they are not guilty of contempt of court for disobeying a writ of mandate ordering the city to pay \$30,000 in judgments for city taxes unlawfully levied in 1908.

There is no money on hand, Walsh said, to pay the debt.

"If the court says this is a debt that must be paid, I am for paying it," said Walsh. "If the treasurer has not the money to pay it, the city has no money for the purpose. Why not, then, put the city in jail for not paying the debt?"
