## FLYING WHALES ARE THE LATEST STYLES

### Germany's Latest Airship Said to Exceed All Others in Speed

With General Von Linsingen's Armies on the Russian Front, Aug. 20.—(By mail.)—Germany has added flying whales to her other war wonders of the air. A hundred yards away these new aeroplanes look like giant fish with double fins which have flopped out of water and lie stranded on their bellies on the sand. They have four big eyes on each side. High in the air they are the most startling creatures I have seen on any front. They look like the flying fish one sees on the ocean, many times magnified. On close examination you discover an aeroplane standing about eight feet from the ground. The wings are those of the ordinary aeroplane but the body is shaped like that of a fat fish. The motor is enclosed in the head and at the sides where the eyes of the fish would be, are two windows. The operator or observer can look out from above the fish's back or from the sides through the eyes. (The censor's scissors has deleted a paragraph of the dispatch at this point, possibly carrying more details of the aeroplanes' construction.) These flying whales have greater speed, more bomb carrying capacity and quicker action than any other biplanes in Europe, officers at the German aviation camp told me. The one I saw was not large. The Germans have other aeroplanes much larger, equipped with two motors and carrying three or four persons, but for purposes of combat the "flying whales" cannot be equalled, even by the famous French Nieuport machines.

### Hanly Attacks Both Wilson and Hughes

San Francisco, Sept. 21.—The name of President Wilson today was injected into the state prohibition fight, through the campaign of J. Frank Hanly and Dr. Ira Landreth, prohibition candidate for president and vice-president. Oliver W. Stewart, national campaign manager for the prohibitionists, telegraphed the president asking if the "wets" are misrepresenting him by including his name in a list of "eleven widely known Americans" who "favor temperance but oppose prohibition." The prohibitionists' campaign train swung through central California yesterday, and at every meeting the "wets" distributed leaflets putting President Wilson on record as an anti-prohibitionist. These tactics were continued today as the "dry" train started for southern California. In each of his speeches Hanly scored Charles E. Hughes for his silence on the liquor question.

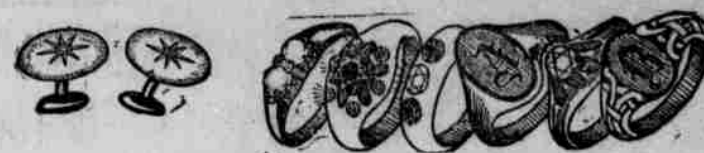
### Smuggling Cases Dropped from Calendar

San Francisco, Sept. 21.—The smuggling conspiracy cases growing out of the discovery of Chinese coolies aboard the liner Mongolia were definitely settled today before Federal Judge Dooling, when the government asked for a dismissal. United States District Attorney Preston's motion followed conferences with the attorney general's office in which it was decided that there is not sufficient evidence to warrant a trial. Involved in the case were Deputy Immigration Commissioner William T. Boyce, Immigration Inspectors Strand, Hayes, Suth, Clendenin and Graham, W. T. Torney, customs broker; Joseph Tape, railroad coolie labor contractor, and six officers and 14 members of the crew of the Mongolia. The men were indicted after 86 coolies were discovered aboard the Mongolia last November.

### TAFT WOULD HAVE RECOGNIZED HUERTA

#### Says He Refrained From Doing So In Order Not to Embarrass Wilson

Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 21.—Ex-President Taft would have recognized Huerta had he continued in office, he declared in a copyrighted article in the October issue of Yale Review. He only refrained, he said, because President Wilson's inauguration followed Huerta's accession to the presidency of Mexico by but 11 days and he did not want to embarrass his successor. "It was amateur diplomacy and statesmanship which led Mr. Wilson and Mr. Bryan to assume the right to convict Huerta and declare him ineligible to become the president of Mexico," wrote Taft. "The complicity of Huerta in the killing of Madero has not been established. Huerta himself denied it and there were reasons for attributing the act to others." Taft also attacked President Wilson's handling of the Lusitania question on the grounds that he exposed the country to charges of "weakness and vacillation." The appointment of William J. Bryan as secretary of state furnished a clue to the record of mistakes of the Wilson administration, he said.

### Wives and Mothers to Vote On Conscription

Melbourne, Sept. 21.—Wives and mothers of Australia will go to the polls within a few weeks to decide whether or not they shall send their husbands and sons to war. It is probably the first time in the history of the world that the women of any large country have been permitted to make such a choice. The house of representatives today passed a bill calling for a referendum on the question of conscription. It is considered certain that the bill will pass the senate. Women voters probably will decide whether the conscription measure,

strongly advocated by Premier Hughes, will be approved at the referendum. It is the general belief that it will. Thousands of women with relatives already at the front are certain to vote their approval.

House Passes It. Melbourne, Sept. 21.—The Australian house of representatives today adopted conscription by a vote of 47 to 12.
