Alexander, who has turned back National league clubs 15 times this season in shutout games, had not worked since Saturday when he twice defeated the Reds.

The Dodgers, after leading the National league parade for five months, surmounting obstacles at the crucial moments and then dropped into weird play which snatched their foundation from under them, find themselves confronted by the most grueling series of the season.

If they can take a majority of the three games they will have a lead which will make them favorites for the pennant. And the same goes for the Phillies. The Giants will close the season with the Dodgers and those Giants, it must be admitted, stand well up in National league society.

In the American league today it is simply a case of beginning where they left off yesterday. The Red Sox, having drawn half a game nearer to the Johnson flag, engage the Yankees again. Detroit will be idle but the White Sox will meet Cleveland. Two games and a half now stand between Bill Carrigan and another world's series pie.
