EIGHT ARE KILLED IN STREET CAR CRASH

Failed to Lower Gate and Freight Train Hit Heavily Loaded Car

Detroit, Mich., Oct. 2.—On the shoulders of 65-year-old Valentine Showski, \$35 a month gateman employed by the Grand Trunk railroad, the state of Michigan will attempt to place the responsibility for the fatal street car crash early today that caused the death of eight persons and injury to 36 others.

The car was thrown 15 feet from the track by the impact and partially overturned hurling passengers under the wheels of the still moving freight.

The dead: Baby daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Koller, age 24.

Officers Make Raid of Gay Road House Oregon City, Ore., Oct. 2.—The merry tink of glasses, tuneful melody poured out on a piano and a set of drums, the swish of silk dresses, the noise of tip-toeing dancers and songs, sang more for the pleasure of the singers than for the listeners, interrupted in true Bohemian style at the Friars' club at 1:30 o'clock Sunday morning when Sheriff Wilson and nine deputies swept down on the place, with about as much surprise to the 50 or 60 persons in the resort as if the Willamette had suddenly dried up or Milwaukee had been wiped off the map.
