Nothing could be plainer than the ezar's bed chamber, where he and his son sleep. Between the two beds, against the wall, is a small night table, and upon this are small frames, holding pho tographs of various members of the im perial family. On the wall, over the table, are two or three more photographs and a couple of ikons. A few arm chairs, a small curtained bookease and a musi-cal instrument, half mandolin, half guitar, the property of the crown prince, are the other furnishings. The floor is earpeted. In cold weather the room is heated by a fireplace with the great white tiled box-like stove arrangement built in Russian style above it. lighting is by electricity.

The emperor lives in the house of the district governor but he has only two rooms to himself-his study and the bedroom which he shares with his heir. Since assuming command of the army the czar has visited and reviewed every

He goes to church every holiday and since there are more than 100 holidays in the Russian year, he is at church at least once every three days.
