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ONLY ONE SUBMARINE SAY NAVAL OFFICIALS

Nothing Heard From the Kingston's Crew—Nothing Heard of Raider

Newport, R. I., Oct. 10.—Although Admiral Gleaves received a radio from the Conyngham that two of the missing crews of the Kingston had been picked up off Nantucket lightship late yesterday, they had not been landed here at an early hour this morning.

A radio dispatch to Admiral Gleaves yesterday stated that the Conyngham had picked up two survivors, but the admiral said today that there had been an error in transmission and that so far as he knew no survivors had been found.

Naval officers united today in expressing the opinion voiced by Admiral Gleaves that only one German U boat is responsible for the sinking of the six merchantmen.

Yesterday no word of the German raider reached here. The American destroyers which returned late last night reported no signs of her or of her activities.

A recall order sent out last night by Admiral Gleaves called all but one of the destroyers back from Nantucket and they began arriving here just before daylight. The possibility that the search for the Kingston's crew would be renewed from here today depended largely, naval officers said, on weather conditions.

No official information as to today's movement of the destroyers was given out.

A report that 10 Chinese, members of the crew of the steamer Strathlene were being brought here proved to be without foundation today. The presence of an unusual number of Chinese sailors along the waterfront accounted for the rumor.

A line of American destroyers, strung out five miles apart, swept the Atlantic today in the vicinity of Nantucket shoals lightship in a final effort to discover some trace of the crew of the steamer Kingston or Kingstonian, supposed to have been sunk.

Picking of the prune crop in this district is almost completed. South of this city the work is all done. The young orchards have not turned out as well as expected, many of them yielding less than half a ton to the acre, but it is estimated that the average yield will be close to 1,700 pounds.

Small prunes have advanced in price from half a cent to one cent a pound, but there is no comfort in this fact to the Salem growers, as there are no small prunes to be had here.

150,000 POUNDS OF PRUNES COME IN DAILY

Packing Houses Crowded to the Limit—Average Yield 1,700 Pounds

With 150,000 pounds of prunes coming in daily, the warehouses filled almost to capacity, and difficulty being experienced in getting cars when needed, Manager Robert Paulus of the Salem packing houses is leading the strenuous life these days.

Yesterday the force of 50 girls employed at the union faced 2,400 25-pound boxes of prunes, yet great as is this number it falls 200 boxes short of the record established this season for one day's pack.

Up to last night a total of 1,364, 656 pounds of prunes have been received at the union, and there is little likelihood of a diminution in the flow of the fruit for two weeks.

Never in any previous season has there been so general a distribution of Salem prunes as is in progress at the present time. Shipments are being made as rapidly as the supply of cars will permit to all parts of the United States, and several orders are on file from England.

Manager Paulus confesses to some worry as to how he will clear the floors in sufficient time to take care of the apple crop, which has already begun to come in. It is very evident to even the casual observer that the union plant must be enlarged.

While Oregon growers are taking advantage of what they consider satisfactory prices, and are marketing their prunes as rapidly as possible, California growers are still holding out for higher prices.

The market holds steady at from 6 to 7 cents a pound.
