erment, to use a stock phrase, to put itself at the head of the herd and this is exactly what President Wilson has done.

"And now as to his critics. There are two kinds of people—those who do things, and the mouth workers. Mr. Wilson belongs to the former, while Mr. Hughes is a mouth worker. The man of action is always too busy to do much talking, letting results do the talking for him, while the mouth worker we have always with us. You run across the type a great deal in small country towns. They sit around and say how things ought to be done, but the great point is that they never do anything.

"To my mind it is almost insanity for the American people to even think of supplanting Mr. Wilson—a man who has made good with emphasis—with a judge who quit the supreme court to enter politics.

What Wilson Has Done
 "Why, Wilson has caused to be enacted into law the best ideas of all three great political parties, while prior to his time they were mere subjects of conversation and nothing was really done to put them into practice. The issue in this campaign is not one of party; it is Wilson, and Wilson only. He is not any more of a democrat than he is anything else. He is an American and a statesman, a wonderful statesman.

"Just let your mind run down the list of what he has accomplished, from the federal reserve law to the rural credits law, and any clear and honest thinking man must be convinced that he is a man of wonderful intelligence and remarkable foresight working whole heartedly for the best interests of the American nation."

Where the Money Has Gone
 Reverting to a discussion of the rural credits legislation, Mr. Hanley declared that it fairly "made his blood boil to see how easy it was to get millions to erect large buildings in the city, while millions of acres in the country, on which hundreds of thousands of happy homes could be made and on which they should be made for the future welfare of this republic were going to waste."

"It takes the soil, the fact that one is producing something and has something in view, to produce the kind of character that is necessary to the nation," he declared. "As it is now, we are becoming a nation of city wage-workers whose spirit is crushed out and who do things automatically. President Wilson saw this and, seeing it, acted."

ROOSEVELT, BENSON AND GOLDBUGS THERE

Phoenix, Arizona, Is Center of Political Affairs of Whole Country

Phoenix, Ariz., Oct. 20.—To Arizona today Phoenix is the "political hub of the universe." A seething, churning battleground sort of a hub that threatens to break all turmoil records established by a trainload of women who are stumping for Hughes.

With the stage all set for a vitriolic verbal battle between Colonel Roosevelt, republican, and Allan Benson, socialist, who expound their party doctrines here at the same hour tomorrow, the Hughes special pulled in from Los Angeles four hours late—and a magnificent breakfast which had been elaborately spread on schedule time was waiting—cold. Some staunch republican members on the entertainment committee nearly wept, so disappointing was the entry of the women aboard the special train.

A clamorous welcome at the Southern Pacific station, however, and a bubbling over of enthusiasm soon mended things and dates for morning appearances of the Hughes women were set. Unlike other western cities, democratic women were not waiting at the depot on mass—the Wilson women were waiting further down the street, where a "dignified protest" was to have been staged. But the protest had hardly begun when the republican women ran up a huge yellow banner across a street in the shopping district, blazoning forth in big letters, "Vote against Wilson." Then all pretenses of dignity were dropped.

Suddenly the streamer was cut down and it fell into the street. Members of the Womens Wilson League were accused, but they denied it.

"That banner cost fifty six dollars," exclaimed a fair republican committee member, as a new one was run up—"you bet its going to stay put."

Twenty minutes later the Wilson women counter attacked, putting a huge banner directly over the first, reading "Vote for Wilson."

Guards were immediately stationed by both organizations.

Fresh outbreaks of heckling and counter heckling were anticipated at headquarters of both organizations.

VILLA IN CONTROL OF WESTERN CHIHUAHUA

Carranza Gathers Forces at Chihuahua Expecting Attack by Bandit

El Paso, Texas, Oct. 20.—The entire western and southern portions of the Mexican state of Chihuahua are now under control of Pancho Villa, according to admissions made by Mexican de facto officials at Juarez, as details of the bandit chief's bold raid last Tuesday on the town of San Andres began to reach the border today.

The town of San Andres is only 25 miles west of Chihuahua City on the Mexico Northwestern railway line. Despite protestations of vigorous pursuit of the Villistas, refugees at Juarez declare that Carranzista troops are making no effort to chase the bandits and are avoiding contact with them.

Thousands of Carranzista troops brought from southern Mexico are being held in Chihuahua City to reinforce the de facto garrison there, as military authorities expect another attack soon upon the city by Villa.

Villa has ordered every detachment of his command operating in Chihuahua to inform the Mexican people he is personally with that band, in order to cause confusion as to his actual personal location.

WASHINGTON GLADDEN TO SUPPORT WILSON

Columbus, O., Oct. 20.—The republican campaign of vilification, which he likens to that waged against Abraham Lincoln in 1864, has caused Dr. Washington Gladden, the distinguished clergyman and author, a lifelong republican, to declare himself for President Wilson's re-election.

Dr. Gladden cast his first vote in 1860 for Lincoln and has voted for every republican elected to the presidency since. In 1912 he was a leader in the progressive movement.

"The ideals and principles of progressive democracy," he said, "are better represented today by the democratic party and its leaders than by the republican party and its leaders."

Candor Doubles as Election Nears.
 In his statement, made public through the columns of the Columbus Citizen, Dr. Gladden further says:

"With Mr. Wilson's general conception of political duty and responsibility in a democracy I am in cordial agreement. The moderation and rationality exhibited by Mr. Wilson in the conduct of our national affairs were almost universally recognized by our people during the first year of the war. When the election drew near the candor began to bubble.

"Those of us who are old enough to remember the election of 1864 and the tempest of vilification and accusation which burst upon the head of Abraham Lincoln during the campaign preceding his second election, know what to look for in a time like this.

Wonders About Wavering Voters.
 "I wonder if a debate led by eminent men in which each a record as Mr. Wilson has made can be reviewed by his opponents without a generous or appreciative word. If really good politics, I wonder how many wavering voters it has confirmed in their purpose to vote for Mr. Wilson. I know of one."
