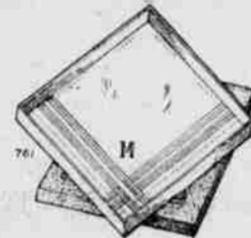

During the week of October 13-19, two fatal accidents were reported to the industrial accident commission. A total of 295 accidents were reported in all. The fatalities were: A. Leach, killed in a Klamath Falls sawmill, and Steven Melch, a logger, killed at Black Rock. Of the accidents reported 236 were subject to the provisions of the compensation act.

Jesse Millet was tried yesterday evening in the municipal court on a charge of bootlegging, was found guilty and fined \$25. He was tried by a jury which recommended leniency. He was not able to pay the fine and was remanded to jail. Officers White and Varney were the principal witnesses and brought in evidence marked money and the bottle of liquor sold.
