these troops to attack at once. The Venetist troops that occupied Katerina are being reinforced from Salonika and are reported well-supplied with machine guns. In several parts of Thessaly parties of revolutionary troops, coming in contact with the royalist forces, have exchanged desultory shots and at Gaidari recently the king's soldiers attacked some of the Venetists. It is believed here that if a battle is fought at Katerina, it will result in general engagements that will plunge Greece into civil war.

**French Tave All Verdun Troops** Paris, Nov. 3.—French troops re-occupied Fort Vaux without losing a single man, it was officially announced today. The Germans evacuated the position under the pressure of heavy French bombardment and the gradual encircling movement of French infantry. Before quitting Vaux, the Germans caused several explosions aiming to damage the fort. The French waited until three explosions had ceased and they entered the position without any fighting.

All the Verdun forts are now firmly held by the French. **Capture German Trench** London, Nov. 3.—British troops captured a German trench east of Guedecourt in a resumption of the fighting on the Somme front yesterday, General Haig reported today. The position was secured last night.

## State House News

For the purpose of making a survey of the construction of a road from Eugene to Marshfield the state highway commission met yesterday with a delegation from Douglas and Lane counties and allowed an appropriation of \$4,000. This appropriation is made on the condition that Lane county provide a similar sum for the survey and construction. Previous to this, the state had allowed \$5,000 to Douglas county for building a road from Roseburg to Myrtle Point. On the recommendation of State Engineer Lewis the highway commission allowed traveling expenses for a trip to the east for Professor S. H. Graf, of Corvallis, for the purpose of attending a pavement testing meeting, in Washington, D. C. Prof. Graf is the head of the department of experimental engineering at the Oregon Agricultural college. He is also the engineer in charge of the tests for the highway department.

E. E. Brodie, editor of the Oregon City Enterprise, and president of the State Editorial association, was appointed yesterday as a member of the commission to make a survey of the conditions of the penitentiary in place of Bishop W. T. Sumner, who wired the prison board that he would be unavoidably detained in the east and that on arrival on the coast would have to party for vice president, has openly declared for President Wilson, and is now campaigning for his election. Now, as a matter of simple fairness and common honesty, I suggest to the progressives of Oregon, that they do not vote for me as a progressive presidential elector, let your vote be for the expression of an idea. As progressives let us vote from influence of reason and not from the heartless instincts of hate and prejudice. Your vote should express the incarnation of a principle. President Wilson has wisely originated and approved the most beneficial legislation known in the last half century of our national life. With the wisdom of a Nestor and the courage of a Titus he has challenged the vampire crew of special privilege, and, so far, no successful criticism has cast a single aspersion upon his acts as president. ## To the Progressive Voters of Oregon

At the primary election held in April, 1916, you elected me as a progressive presidential elector. When one is elected to any office in the state of Oregon, and the vote canvassed, and the result announced, it is then the duty of the governor of this state to sign and issue a certificate of election, and the secretary of state must place the name of the successful candidate on the ballot; the governor and secretary of state have no other election or option in the premises. Under the law of Oregon, a candidate elected to an office must accept the same; the law is compulsory, and he could not resign even though he so desired.
