Never has Salem society or lovers of music enjoyed or displayed a more flattering appreciation of art than they did Wednesday night at the Presbyterian church when Hartridge Whipp, the eminent baritone, and Mrs. Leonora Fisher Whipp, pianist, of Portland, gave a concert in this city.

Mr. Whipp's ability was a surprise, even to those who were skeptical of press notices which heralded his coming. Endowed with a magnificent voice of great range and virility the singer's audience was his to possess from the opening group of Italian songs to the final offering of Walter Damrosch's "Danny Deever." His magnetic personality and gracious explanation of the respective songs' history only served to increase the general pleasure of his masterly renditions.

It would be difficult to discern which numbers pleased most; possibly it was the group of German songs including Strauss' "Allerseelen," Hugo Wolf's charming "Zur Ruh, Zur Ruh" and Carl Loewe's dramatic "Edlekinig." The syllabic precision and command of technique were wonderful. Frau La Forge's "To a Messenger" was exceptionally well received as was also negro melodies by the gifted colored composer, Harry T. Burleigh and Samuel Cherridge Taylor.

In the midst and recitative work Mr. Whipp is splendid and really it was in these offerings that the artist showed his widely diversified command of his interpretative art. "Hear Me Ye Winds and Waves" by Handel and "Vision Fugitive (Heroldique)" by Jules Massenet of the French school were sung with an executive technique and dra-

matic brilliancy which truly inspired. His encores were likewise splendid. Leonora Fisher Whipp's work as accompanist greatly served to add to the pleasure of those attending.
