Minister Missing Since Saturday

Roseburg, Ore., Nov. 7.—The failure
of Rev. T. Y. Ragsdale, of Ten-Mile, to
keep his appointments to preach at
Looking Glass and Brockway, Sunday,
was responsible for a search being started
here today by the officers. It was
finally discovered by Marshall Williams
that the minister had driven a horse
and buggy to this city Saturday after-
noon and had later boarded a train for
Sacramento. Relatives of the man in this
vicinity can assign no reason for his sud-
den departure.

Two Arrested for Stealing Brass Locks

Roseburg, Ore., Nov. 7.—William O.
'Brien and James Ryan, who were ar-
rested here recently charged with steal-
ing 47 brass locks used in sealing rural
mail boxes, yesterday were surren-
dered to the federal authorities and will
be taken to Portland for hearing.
The men say they purchased the
locks from a third person, but this is
denied by E. J. Gallagher, special govern-
ment agent, who filed a formal complai-
nt against them.

Portlanders Buy In Klamath Falls

Klamath Falls, Ore., Nov. 7.—Another
big realty deal for Klamath Falls was
closed recently when J. W. Siemens,
president of the First State & Savings
Bank of this city, purchased from
George Niehn, of this city, 45 feet on
the north side of Main street, between
Sixth and Seventh streets. The property
is now occupied by the Donart pool
room, the Ewanna barbershop and Har-
denbrook, the tailor. It is improved
with a one story frame building.

Car Jumps Bridge Fifty Are Drowned

Boston, Mass., Nov. 7.—A surface car
crossing Summer street bridge jumped
the tracks and plunged into Fort Point
Channel shortly before six o'clock to-
night. More than 50 men and women
were aboard the car and many are be-
lieved to have been drowned.

Final Rush in Jersey

Jersey City, N. J., Nov. 7.—There
was a final rush to the voting booths
between five and seven this evening,
when nearly a third of the ballot
wielders marked tickets. Two-thirds of
the voters had balloted up to two this
afternoon, a lull of several hours fol-
lowing.

May Have Revolution in Lower California

San Diego, Cal., Nov. 7.—An alleged
plot to overthrow Colonel Cantu and
seize Lower California by a new Mexi-
can political party, the nationalists,

has been frustrated here today by fed-
eral officers, who have seized a quan-
tity of arms and ammunition being ship-
ped through this city en route to the
border rendezvous from where the at-
tack was to be made. Several cases of
ammunition and a wardrobe trunk in
which a number of Winchester and
Martin rifles were packed, wrapped in
Los Angeles newspapers, are held in
the federal building here.
