### KANSAS AS USUAL PROVES A SURPRISE

### Goes for Wilson, Splits Even on Congress and Has Republican Governor

Topeka, Nov. 8.—Topeka has given Woodrow Wilson 19,000 to 15,000 plurality over Hughes, possibly more. It has chosen four democratic and four republican congressmen, gave a republican governor the largest plurality any candidate has ever received, elected a republican legislature and then picked democratic and republican local officials indiscriminately.
