dier votes yet to be counted. The great element of doubt is the recount in Hennepin (Minnesota) county. This county has the largest vote of any in the state. When Ramsey (St. Paul) county, the second largest, and St. Louis (Duluth) county, the third largest, were officially canvassed, it resulted in a change of figures which netted Wilson 349 in Ramsey and 62 in St. Louis. In Red Lake county, received today, the official count helped Wilson net 38.

The Hennepin count does not begin until Thursday and will take at least four days. Thus far the canvass, mail votes and soldier votes, in the aggregate, have been slightly in favor of President Wilson.

STANDARD OIL ADOPTS AN EIGHT HOUR DAY
San Francisco, Nov. 14.—The Standard Oil company offices here today posted a bulletin announcing that the company has adopted the eight hour day for employees, skilled and unskilled. This came as a surprise and applies to the refineries, pipelines and producing departments. There will be no change in wages, it was announced. The plan is to become operative as soon as details are completed.

NORTHCUTT ABLE TO MANAGE AFFAIRS

Supreme Court Decides Long Drawn Out Case—Three Other Opinions

S. T. Northcutt, a resident of Turner, according to the decision of the Oregon supreme court, after having been adjudged incompetent to take care of his own affairs by Judge William Bushey and decreed to be able and competent by Judge Galloway, is still able to manage his own affairs and not to require a guardian. It will be remembered that this case has been before the Marion county courts for the past two years and developed out of a petition by Mrs. Eva Palmerton, daughter of Northcutt, to have Judge Bushey, county judge, appoint a guardian to take care of his fortune, which amounts in notes and mortgages, to \$20,000. She is the only child and alleged that by reason of his age and mental and physical infirmities he had been defrauded of considerable property and was incapable of conducting his own business.

Northcutt replied to this petition by saying that he was able to look after his own affairs and charged his daughter with being "afraid that some portion of the estate will be spent on some other person than herself," and declared he planned to leave the state because of his health, and because he was going to marry in Marion county and go to Missouri.

Mrs. Palmerton answered this counter charge by stating that her only purpose was to protect her father from the machinations and schemes of dishonest and designing persons. He Wrote Poetry After hearing the case Judge Bushey decided Northcutt was not able to take care of himself and appointed a guardian for the estate. An appeal was made by Mrs. Palmerton to the circuit court and Judge Galloway decided Northcutt was competent to manage his affairs and set the appointment aside. She then appealed to the supreme court. Judge Harris, who rendered the opinion,

said the code conferred on the various county courts the authority to appoint guardians for a designated class of persons and unless Northcutt comes under one of those classes a guardian cannot legally be appointed. The designated persons are "insane persons, idiots, and all incapable of conducting their own affairs."

In the investigation to determine Northcutt's competence, the decision recites that he had accumulated a fortune by thrift and good business management. He has cared for his daughter and her children and is termed a "live business man." He is also a poet and it was stated that his poetry was "in a class by itself," and "could be better," yet "through them all runs a connective chain." His daughter said that in 1913, about the time the Cherrians were offering a \$10 prize for a poem, he would rise between two and four o'clock in the morning and recite poems, and in imagination, would address the chairman of the Cherrians and release poetry. It was found that he was working for the \$10 prize. The decision states that up to the time of his proposed marriage to the woman in the case, and removal to Missouri to live, no complaint had been made, or petition filed. The court finds that the daughter had no right to say her father should not marry nor whom he should marry. Justices Moore, McBride and Bean concurred in affirming the decision of the circuit court.

The Other Decisions

Norris Safe and Lock company, appellant, against J. R. Weaver, et al., respondents, an appeal from Malheur county from decision of Judge Dalton Biggs, an action to enforce against alleged stockholders the payment of a balance due upon a judgment recovered by the plaintiff against their corporation; affirmed by Justice Burnett. Henry Levy, respondent against Nevada-California-Oregon Railroad, an appeal from Lake county from decision of Judge Dale, an action for breach of contract; affirmed by Justice Burnett. G. T. Treadgold, appellant, against Frank E. Willard, respondent, appeal from Coos county from decision of Judge Coke, an action to recover money; reversed by Justice Moore. A rehearing was denied in the case of Douglas Creditors association against Hutchason. A. C. Ennes of Portland, was granted permanent permission to practice law in Oregon. The case of the First National Bank of Portland against Courtright is on for rehearing this afternoon. It was decided several months ago in favor of the defendants. A. B. Ridgeway of Portland represents the defendant and Senator Joseph Simon represents the bank.
