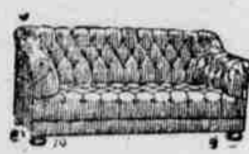

## PRINCETON AND YALE TO MEET TOMORROW

Expert Says It Bids Fair To Be Hardest Fought Battle of Colleges

New York, Nov. 16.—Indications today are stronger than ever that those who journey to Princeton Saturday will be rewarded with one of the hardest fought football games that has taken place between the Yale building and the Princeton tiger for many a day.  
The reason is this: Dave Tibbitts has returned to the Princeton lineup and there is every probability he will get a chance to insert a thrill or two by attempting field goals. Charles Sheldon, Yale tackle, who was sent to the infirmary and counted out of football for the rest of his days, again is wearing togs at New Haven and the chances are very good that he will get into action against Princeton. Most surely he will be ready for the big combat with Harvard.

These two facts are enough to instill life and pep into the two teams.  
Princeton, accorded more than an even chance to lay the blue low, is falling some in the estimation of critics since it has developed that not once this year has so much energy been shown in offensive work as right down in daily practice at Yale. The backfield is playing an extraordinary string with Jaquez, Neville and Legore in the points.  
Tibbitts has been out several times trying out his toe for the Tigers, but so far has been kept out of scrimmage practice. His place has been filled by Ames, who is said to be showing well as a half back.

**Boxing Contests Only**  
New York, Nov. 16.—That the New York state law which allows ten round no decision boxing "exhibitions" will shortly be put to a test, was indicated today by the wrath of the managers of Harry Pierce and Shamus O'Brien, lightweights who met a few nights ago. Their bout was stopped by the referee, who declared the men were not doing their best.

The boxing commission ruled that the referee was right in stopping the bout and refusing to allow the boxers any pay for their services. According to the New York critics, if O'Brien and Pierce carry the matter to the courts, which they have intended to do it will raise the question of whether the commission has the right to demand that the boxers fight instead of boxing. The state law allows only "boxing for exhibitions."

**Berkeley is Cheerful**  
Berkeley, Cal., Nov. 16.—Despite the fact that the enemy will invade Berkeley tomorrow, coaches and players of the University of California football squad were decidedly cheerful today. Although they are not doing much boisterous talking, they hope to land the long end of the score when California meets the University of Washington here Saturday afternoon.

The Washington squad led by the lugubrious coach, Gil Dobie, will arrive tonight. Tomorrow morning the north-erners will be given the use of California field for practice work.  
A general shakeup in the California lineup is expected Saturday.

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 16.—The Northwestern lightweight boxing title changed hands here last night when Lloyd Madden, of Seattle, gained an undisputed four round decision over Harry Anderson of Vancouver, B. C., in a shattering battle, in a snooker staged by the Moose club in Dreamland rink.

Harry Pollok Has Heard Nothing from Jess Willard Regarding Project

New York, Nov. 16.—In spite of the fact that Harry Pollock, manager of Freddie Welsh, and Charley Weinert, has heard nothing from Jess Willard regarding the proposal of James Foffroth and Baron Long to stage a series of finish fights at Tijuana, Pollok is not letting the project slip. He came out today with a statement to the United Press in which he charged that Willard is afraid to meet Weinert.  
"Jess Willard is still wrapped in silence regarding the offer from Baron Long for a championship match at Tijuana with Charley Weinert," Pollok's typewriter spat out today. "Eight thousand dollars is a lot of dough, but Jess evidently has been given the low-down on the manner in which the New

York heavyweight has "come on" during the past few months, and is going to let well enough alone. It was Weinert's twenty first birthday a couple of weeks ago and he is growing so fast that every week he has to be measured for a suit of clothes. He has hit the 200 mark and is six feet two. Every day he gets bigger and is so strong and hits so hard it is impossible to get a sparring partner for him."  
And that is some statement, some growing and some hitting. Anyone who grows fast enough to command the attention of a tailor every week is entitled to a few fights and Jess ought to loosen up. Also, perhaps, the statement will serve to provide Weinert with a sparring partner or so. But the end is not in sight. Pollok kept tight on statement with the following line:  
"Jess does not seem to be the only one who has been tipped off, as Carl Morris flatly refused to meet him when offered a match in Kansas City. Instead of taking on Weinert, Morris let him match him up with Dan Morgan's battered battler, Battling Levinsky. The battler had just been given a four-forty trimming by a second rate, unknown middleweight, one Billy Miske. Morris surely believes in picking them out while they are soft."
