Hop Market Prices Are Holding Steady

Portland, Or., Nov. 17.—Hop prices are holding steady, as shown by the sale of the Flannagan & Cornell crop of 300 bales, at Grants Pass, to the Wolf Hop company at 12 cents. The entire hop holdings of the late Fred Back, amounting to 1390 bales, have been disposed of. The Seavey Hop company bought 425 bales of the Inde-

pendence crop at 9 cents, and the F. S. Johnson company purchased the Hopmore crop of 340 bales at the same figure. The olds, aggregating about 500 bales, were also sold, but the price was not announced. Julius Wolf bought 150 bales from the association at 11 1/2 cents. The Met-schen & Cooper crop of 300 bales, grown at Corvallis and also in the association, was sold at 10 cents. The Kyle lot of about 100 bales at Aurora, brought 11 cents.

Butter is Higher

There will be a 2 cent advance in the butter market this morning, as announced by city creameries yesterday, the jobbing price of prints going to 40 cents. The buying prices of butter fat will be raised 3 cents to 40 cents for No. 1 and 38 cents for No. 2. The short make of fresh butter and the reduction of storage stocks is given as the reason for the rise. The country creamery market is also firm and street stocks are kept closely cleaned up. At the exchange extras were offered at 37 cents, but there were no bids. Dairy butter was offered at 39 cents, without bids. No sales of eggs were made on the board. Case count was offered at 48 cents, with 46 cents bid, and eastern storage was offered at 35 cents with no bid. Jobbers are quoting candied Oregon fresh at 48@50 cents and select are being sold by creameries up to 52 cents. The cheese market was firm. Tillamook triplets were offered at the exchange at 22 cents and 21 cents was bid. The same price was bid for Tillamook Young Americans, for which 21 1/2 cents was asked. Oregon Young Americans were offered at 21 1/2 cents with no bid. There was a good supply of poultry on the street and the demand was good at firm prices. Dressed veal and pork were also firm. Dealers were heavily stocked with country dressed beef for which there was little or no call. Offers to sell at 3 1/2 to 5 cents did not tempt buyers.

Berries Advance

Two prominent commodities, both of which are in demand at the present time, have just acroplanted to new top prices for the season. One, cranberries, are in especially heavy demand now because of the approach of the holidays and the other, beans, are sold the year round but in larger quantities during cold weather than in the summer months. Prices asked are not new records on either commodity but are not far from them. Dealers this morning advanced the price of Late Howe cranberries to \$12.50 a barrel and report the market as very firm at that figure. Supplies of these berries are not as large as in previous years and it is difficult to get additional stocks owing to the car shortage. Those on hand are of exceptional quality but are not sufficient to supply the demand.

RAILROAD SHOPS BURN

Sau Bernardino, Cal., Nov. 17.—The Santa Fe railway depot and car shops were a blackened mass of wreckage today and nine men were suffering from injuries sustained fighting fire which swept the railway properties last night. The total loss was placed at \$225,000. Half a dozen telegraphers and office attaches were trapped on the second floor of the depot building. They were rescued in a spectacular manner.

Spaulding Logging Manager Victim of Accident

Newberg, Or., Nov. 17.—Glen O. Dasset, manager of the Spaulding Logging company, was killed last night when a log slipped from a car, near which he was standing, struck him and broke his back. He died within a few minutes. Mr. Dasset was superintending the unloading of several cars of logs at the Spaulding mill about 5 o'clock and was standing near one of the cars when a log came down the runway sooner than he expected and he was unable to dodge it. His back was broken in two places and one ankle fractured. Raising his head a moment, he said, "I'm killed," and died. Mr. Dasset was about 50 years old and had managed properties of the Spaulding company here for the past five years. He is survived by his wife and nine children. He was active during his entire residence here in all civic affairs and was a member of the board of trade of the Newberg Commercial club. He took a prominent part in the meetings of the club and was also an active member of the Christian church. He was a Mason, a member of the Order of the Eastern Star and of the Woodmen of the World, all of which orders probably will participate in the funeral services. An inquest was held last night by Coroner Tibbony of McMinnville.
