Attempt of Republicans Official to Hold Up Vote of California on Quibble

Sacramento, Cal., Nov. 22.—Secretary of State Jordan sprung a sensation this afternoon when he announced that because presidential election returns as received by his office are incomplete in at least two precincts of the state he may deem it his duty to withhold certificates of election to presidential electors from California pending action by the courts.

ties of the state. "In Marysville precinct number 3, twelve democratic electors are credited with 96 votes each, but the votes received by Loren A. Handley, democratic elector, have not been credited because the election clerk failed to include the vote in their totals to supervisors, the supervisors could not ascertain such vote and therefore the county clerk was unable to include it in the returns to this office. The returns from this county are incomplete. "In the county of Orange a more glaring case of disfranchisement is presented. All the voters of Orangethorpe precinct have been denied an expression of their wishes as indicated by their votes. Because the tally lists are in the sealed envelopes containing the ballots the board of supervisors could not ascertain the vote in that precinct and the returns certified to this office are not complete, because of such omission. "If these mistakes are not corrected in these partial returns are to be accepted, if the will of the voters of these precincts is to be disregarded, even the vote of one elector why cannot other mistakes be permitted to occur in other counties and precincts and thus the will of the voters be thwarted and confusion result? "It is the duty of the republican and democratic state central committees to take immediate steps to have these mistakes corrected, even if the aid of the courts must be invoked; otherwise, the secretary of state, may deem it his duty to withhold certificates of election of presidential electors from California in order that an evil precedent may not be established."

Party For 1350 Students To Be Given in Portland

University of Oregon, Eugene, Nov. 22.—Thirteen hundred and fifty men and women will be invited to a monster at home to be given, by the extension division of the University of Oregon in Portland, November 25, in co-operation with the Central library staff and with alumni. Every one of those invited will be a student of the university. The 1,350 all live in Portland, and they are the students of the extension classes and the correspondence study department in Portland alone. Last year there were only 600 of them. The sudden growth has been so great that the university has been put to it to meet the demand. Having 20 Portland classes in operation, some meeting weekly, others every second week, and having an enrollment in each of from 25 to 250, the extension division decided to try to get the means acquainted with one another and with the significance of the extension movement. Hence the novel party, which will be given in the big north gallery of the Central library, and will be informal. North gallery holds 1,000 persons.

Puget Sound Yard Base of Reserve Fleet

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 22.—Official announcement of the selection of the Puget Sound navy yard as the base of the Pacific reserve fleet was made today by Captain Robert E. Coontz, commandant of the yard, after receipt of orders direct from the navy department at Washington, D. C. Present headquarters of the Pacific reserve fleet is at the Mare Island navy yard. The orders received from the navy department that all ships of the reserve fleet proceed at once to the Puget Sound yard and take up their station there in readiness for active service. All ships now being repaired at their home yards are directed to proceed to the Puget Sound yard as soon as repairs are completed and remain there.

DRY SQUAD RAIDERS CAPTURE MUCH BOOZE

Find 1,008 Bottles of Whiskey Shipped in Cases Marked "Beer"

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 22.—Federal officers today were investigating the illegal smuggling of 1,008 bottles of whiskey shipped into Seattle from San Francisco in boxes marked beer. Permits calling for beer shipments and issued in the regular manner were attached to the individual boxes, according to law. But each consignment, when questioned by the authorities declared they had not ordered the liquor. Dry squad officers who discovered the shipment while checking over the liquor brought here aboard the steamship Governor which arrived Tuesday, believed the shipment was engineered by one of the boot legging syndicates here. Labels indicated the shipment was from the California State Wine company of San Francisco. Dry squad officers later went to a Post street warehouse and seized 700 more cartons marked beer.

Opened a Keg of Nails

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 22.—The old wheeze, "Stick around and we'll open a keg of nails" was circulated among dry squad officers searching for smuggled liquor on the waterfront today. They drove axes into the heads of 18 kegs marked "spikes". Each keg contained nails which covered covered smaller kegs containing whiskey.

Brewster Valley Man Won Ranch Because of Wilson's Election

In an interview with a newspaper man at Marshfield, Saturday, Mr. Laird said that his automobile truck against a 30-acre ranch that President Wilson would be re-elected. SUPREME COURT MAY NOT ACT THIS YEAR

Appealed Eight Hour Day Suit May Not Be Reached Before New Year

Washington, Nov. 22.—There was growing doubt here this afternoon that the United States supreme court will be able to render a decision on the Adamson eight hour law before early in January, unless the ponderous machinery of the highest tribunal is speeded to a rate that would set a precedent. The government will be unable formally to submit its appeal before December 4 when the court reconvenes after a two weeks recess. Papers in the case, however, may be filed as soon as the records are transcribed and brought here from Kansas City. This is expected to take four or five days. Under the regular routine the supreme court will convene December 4 for a session until December 22 when recess will be taken over the Christmas holidays. On the calendar for the three weeks session are a number of big cases. To set the Adamson case forward would mean a complete readjustment of the slowly moving judicial routine. Even then it would rush the court beyond any previous instance for the justices to hear what is expected to be unusually long arguments and counter arguments and then deliberate and have their decision written before December 22. The recess is to last until

January 8—provided the whole routine planned is not rearranged. The white house heard of Judge Hook's ruling without comment. Attaches of the executive offices and officials of the department of justice while obviously surprised at the decision, declared the question "of course remains to be finally settled in the United States supreme court." It was said at the white house that no statement or announcement of any kind could be expected.
