TRAINLOAD COMING

FROM CHIHUAHUA

Refugees Expected Yesterday Have Not Yet Been Heard From

Juarez, Mex., Nov. 30.—Seven hundred Carranzista troops, survivors of the battle of Chihuahua City, with 26 pieces of artillery, arrived here shortly before noon today.

The troops were a part of Ojuna's cavalry who escaped on four trains last Monday, after the order to evacuate had been given. General Trevino's command started their retreat to the north-east, the surviving carranzistas said. The fate of Americans and other foreigners in Chihuahua is unknown.

El Paso, Texas, Nov. 30.—At an early hour today a trainload of refugees from Chihuahua City, expected at Juarez since noon yesterday, had not yet reached the border. During yesterday and last night relatives of the six Americans and the German and English residents of the fallen city waited at the station. The telegraph line was open and it was announced every few hours that the train was due at once. Although nothing definite was reported, it is believed all the foreign consuls who were in Chihuahua City are on the train.

Whether any Americans escaped is questioned. In reports reaching the border the presence of other foreigners on the train is mentioned, but nothing is said of Americans.

Carranza officers at Juarez declared today the tracks had been torn up below the border town to prevent Villa capturing a train and coming northward.

Another report here said that Villistas went to the cathedral after the fall of Chihuahua City and desecrated the grave of an American captain buried there in 1845 when Colonel Doniphan captured the city.

Expect Attack on Juarez

El Paso, Texas, Nov. 30.—Active preparations in defense of Juarez against an expected attack by Villa's bandit army were under way early today. In a ring encircling the town rifle pits have been dug for outposts,

WARDS OF THE STATE

HAVE THANKSGIVING

Every Institution Spreads Good Dinner, and Has Entertainment

Wards of the state in the various institutions about this city enjoyed the usual Thanksgiving dinners and programs. In addition to the feasts of turkey, duck, or chicken, programs of music and games formed the entertainment features of the day.

At the Oregon state training school for boys a basket ball game is scheduled for this afternoon. This is to be a sort of tonic for the big dinner. The teams will be picked from among the players at the school.

At the girls' training school a different sort of program is holding the boards. The schedule they have comprises music and readings. The main event at the other schools, in addition to the programs, is the big dinner.

At the Oregon state hospital, the dinner was the most massive and comprehensive of them all. The menu as planned by the chef comprises one ton of turkey, ducks and chicken, 1000 loaves of bread, 27 bushels of mashed potatoes, 215 gallons of salad, 200 gallons of soup, 130 gallons of green beans, 210 gallons of apple sauce, 60 pounds of butter, 95 gallons of giblet stew, 110 gallons of macaroni and cheese, 70 gallons coffee, 30 gallons tea, 206 gallons milk, 110 gallons of rice pudding, 200 pumpkin pies, 300 pounds of fruit cake, and 40 gallons of cranberry sauce.

Alienists to Testify Regarding Sanity

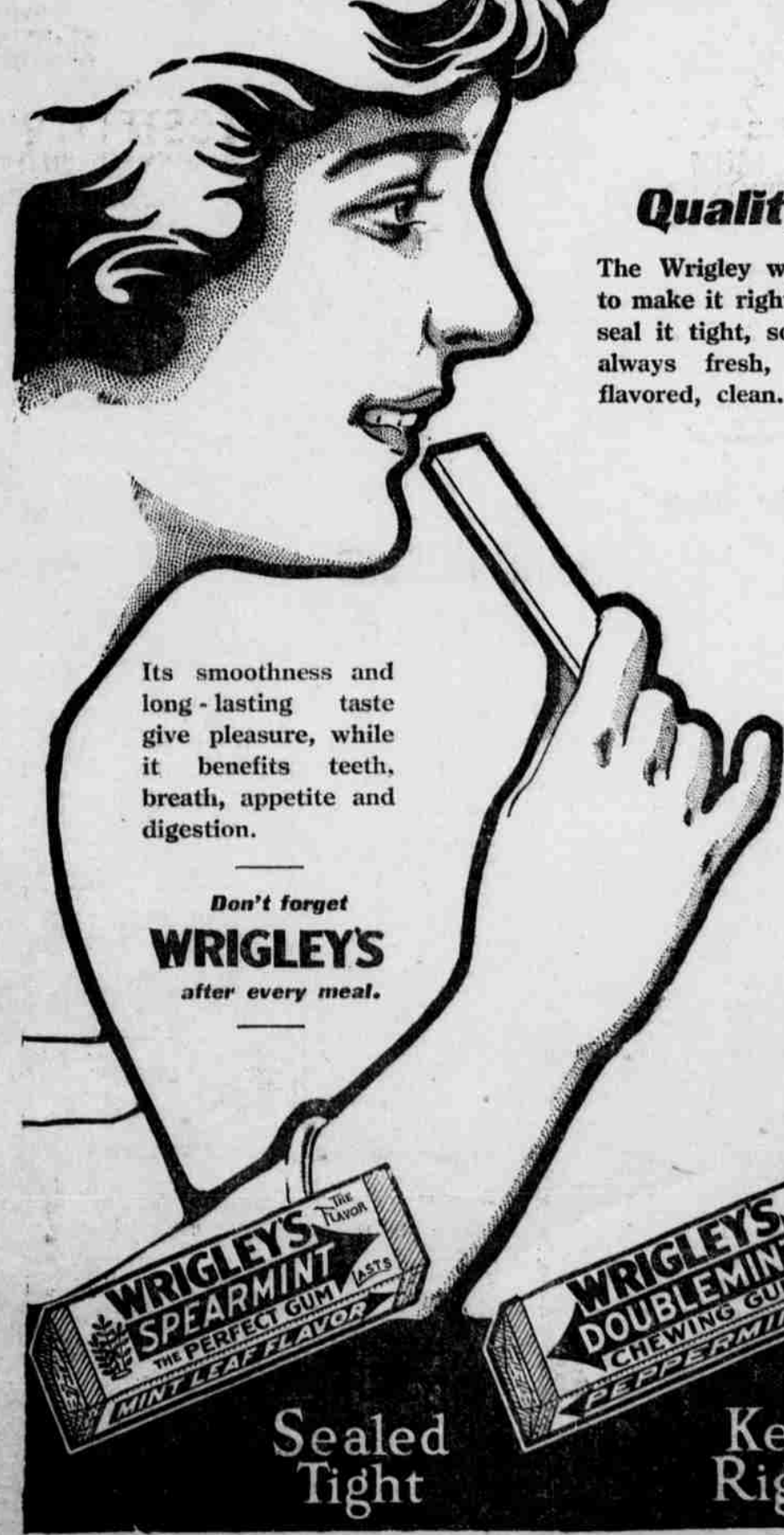
