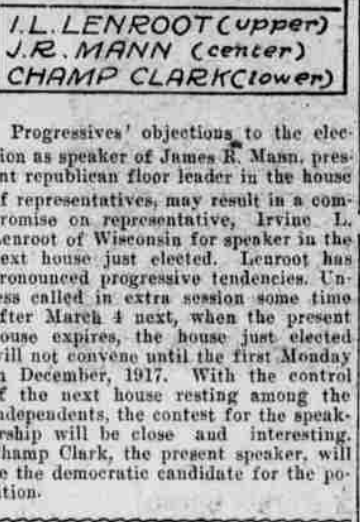

Fight for Speakership Of the Next House Promises Hot Contest

Progressives' objections to the election as speaker of James R. Mann, present republican floor leader in the house of representatives, may result in a compromise on representative, Irving L. Lenroot of Wisconsin for speaker in the next house just elected. Lenroot has pronounced progressive tendencies. Unless called in extra session some time after March 4 next, when the present house expires, the house just elected will not convene until the first Monday in December, 1917. With the control of the next house resting among the independents, the contest for the speakership will be close and interesting. Champ Clark, the present speaker, will be the democratic candidate for the position.
