## ARMY EXPERTS TRY TO DISCOVER PROPER GARB FOR WINTER FLYING



As part of the flight of sixteen government army aeroplanes from the aviation field at Hempstead, N. Y., to Philadelphia, a test was planned of the proper clothing for cold weather flying. The best clothing heretofore has been found to be fur-lined hoods, coats, gloves and leggings, and the result of the test flight is expected to confirm this opinion. In the pictures a full regulation army costume of leather is shown, as well as part of a fur-lined costume devised for the test flight. In many of the reported flights in the European war, especially in recent months, stress has been laid on the sufferings of the men from the cold which is intense at high altitudes even in summer.
