University Notes

The long, prolonged vibration of the electric bell system in Eaton hall this morning ushered in the finale of the 1616-17 Yuletide festivities and the remaining dash to the final examinations which are scheduled from January 29 to February 2, became the focus of attraction. Signs and groans of some student desirous of prolonging the holiday period died with the cheery industrious looks of those determined to make the most of remaining semester's opportunities. On the whole the students were "glad to get back" and before noon the routine of the curriculum's problems was master of this situation. Although more than a few were compelled to pass the vacation hours in Salem, the majority spent their time at a distance.

As penalties are provided in embarrasment to high scholastic standing, the plurality seemed to take special care to return to the first recitations of the day. Several faculty members attended the sessions of the Oregon State Teachers' association which convened in Portland last week and report renewed interest in pedagogical problems.

President Carl Gregg Doney will leave Salem tomorrow evening for Chicago to attend meetings of the educational association of the Methodist Episcopal church and the session of the university senate of the church. Of utmost importance in the furtherance of the church's educational work is the latter organization, the university senate. It is composed of 15 men, each representing a district in the United States presided over by a bishop. Its work is centered in the general supervision of the educational institutions of the church. Dr. Doney was recently honored by being elected to represent the fifteenth district which includes the states of Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

Although still unsettled in the places of his itinerary other than to Chicago, Dr. Doney will likely visit several other of the principal cities of the east, returning to Salem a little over two weeks.

An interesting visitor to Salem and Willamette folk in particular is Harry G. McCain, the eloquent orator and former student who has put up such a winning fight for the cause of prohibition since his departure from Willamette in 1912. Mr. McCain has just finished a strenuous campaign for a "dry" Michigan which resulted in the Wolverine state going dry by a majority of 80,000 votes in the recent election. His work was conducted under the auspices of the Michigan Dry Federation among the college students of that state. The results of the election is ample testimony of the potent effect of his oratorical energy and executive vim.

At present Mr. McCain is visiting with his aunt, Mrs. A. C. Hausman, at 702 North Fourteenth street, and his wife, who is a resident of Salem and a former student of old Willamette. When questioned as to his future plans, Mr. McCain said: "Next time is Kansas City, Missouri. We are going to put her dry at the next election."

An example of the esteem with which Dr. Doney's work is considered in the educational world is to be noted in the current number of the Christian Student, the quarterly publication of the Methodist church board of education which is issued in New York. Here is to be found the complete publication of Dr. Doney's inaugural address which was officially delivered on the occasion of the formal inauguration of Willamette's president at the Salem First church on October 12. Those privileged to hear the address unreservedly vouch for its worthiness to be reprinted in such a standard magazine.

Announcement was made at this morning's chapel hour that Judge Henry Benson of the Oregon supreme court bench, will be the speaker for the regular Y. M. C. A. chapel program tomorrow morning. Judge Benson's masterly address last year was so well received by the thrilled student body who listened to his message that his reappearance tomorrow promises to be one of the best intellectual treats of the year.

SENATE WOULD TAKE EXECUTIVES POWERS

Making Effort to Secure Control of Business Belonging to President

Washington, Jan. 3.—America's diplomacy, especially the secret portion thereof, probably will come in for the biggest airing since the days of the armed ship warning resolution fight last winter, if Senator Hitchcock and his colleagues insist on adoption of his resolution endorsing President Wilson's note to the belligerents.

Senator Harding of Ohio openly declared to the United Press today he believes the endorsement never will pass, "because the movement was conceived and executed in secrecy" and because even members of the senate foreign relations committee, were not consulted.

Republican members threatened openly today to keep up their fight to relegate the resolution to the foreign committee, but, failing in that, to fight for debate—and plenty of it.

Debate would necessarily mean, according to the republicans, that the whole recent diplomatic game would come in for a thorough discussion.

Hitchcock himself was scheduled to read by visiting college presidents and educators at the recent installation of President Doney to direct the affairs of the institution are to be published in pamphlet form. Copy was taken to the printers today and their appearance will occur in about 10 days.

MAKES STATEMENT OF ARIZONA MUDDLE

Governor Hunt Says He Only Wants Matters Settled by the Courts

Phoenix, Ariz., Jan. 3.—Inviting Tom E. Campbell to meet him half way to secure a speedy determination of the contest proceedings now pending in the courts over the right of himself or Campbell to serve as governor of Arizona, George W. P. Hunt, who has served for four years as chief executive of the state, gave the United Press an exclusive statement today. It follows:

(By George W. P. Hunt.)

In declining to yield possession of the governor's office to Thomas E. Campbell, I acted according to my judgment fully within my legal and moral rights. A contest on the validity of my opponent's claim to the governor's office being near to a conclusion, I feel that both parties to the controversy should expedite the court proceedings as much as possible.

Mr. Campbell's counsel, however, has interposed successive legal technicalities resulting in delay and has strenuously objected to an inspection of the ballots. This inspection being finally ordered by the court, is now considerably more than half completed and has disclosed a net gain of 98 votes in my favor. This net gain, is, of course, sufficient when introduced as evidence to offset Campbell's alleged plurality of 30 several times over.

For this reason and because it is my honest conviction that Campbell's counsel, once having placed their client in the governor's chair would resort to dilatory tactics to prolong the contest indefinitely, I feel wholly justified in the position I have assumed. I desire a speedy determination by the court of the issue and wish above all to yield promptly and without question to the sentiment of the people as expressed by their ballots. It is my hope that the republican claimant will meet me half way in securing such a determination. It would be virtually immaterial whether Campbell or myself should win the contest if the issue should be tied up in litigation for a year and a half or two years, during which time one or the other should remain in office under a clouded title.

Weekly Report of Union Stock Yards

North Portland, Or., Jan. 2.—Cattle. The continued light receipts of cattle Monday met a very keen demand and prices ruled a good 25 cents higher than last week when a 50 cent advance on the best beef grades. One load of good steers brought \$8.50 with another load at \$8.35; fair to good kinds brought \$7.50 to \$8.00. All supplies were sold and weighed early, there not being enough here to let each buyer get a load. Shear stuff also sold readily although no strictly good ones were included in the days trade. Best beef cows would no doubt bring \$7.00 or better, fair cows brought around \$6.50 to \$6.75 with ordinary ones around \$6. Only a few bulls available best bringing \$5.25 from feeders. Best heavy bolognas from \$4.25 to \$4.75 with light kinds \$3.50 to \$4. Trading in feeders was limited.

Hogs. Hog prices continued their upward climb Monday again breaking all records for the winter packing season. There was but a moderate run of 2,000 head here which was quickly bought up. Prices were 15 to 20 cents higher on all good kinds while pigs were advanced another 25 cents. The quality of the run was the best of the year. One load of prime heavies brought \$10.25 with another load at \$10.20. Bulk of good packing hogs sold from \$9.95 to \$10.10; pigs brought \$8.50 to \$8.75; stock hogs met a good demand with but a light supply. Best 80 to 125 pound pigs are selling from \$7 to \$7.25.

Sheep. Sheep prices continued their upward climb today when prices on all kinds were quoted 25 cents higher. Good lambs are selling \$10.50 to \$10.75; with good east of the mountain lambs at \$11; good yearlings \$9 to \$9.25 and good mutton ewes \$8 to \$8.25. Supplies continue very light.

Sold postoffice cannot make any great boasts, but there is a gradual increase in the business all the while nevertheless, the Tribune says.

40 Cent Wool Is Outlook for 1917

That woolgrowers of the northwest will receive as high as 40 cents for their 1917 wool clip is the opinion of W. B. Barratt, president of the Oregon Woolgrowers' association, says the Heppner Gazette-Times. He bases his contentions in part from the following letter which he recently received from S. W. McClure, secretary of the National Woolgrowers' association:

Dear Mr. Barratt:—The Wool Live Stock company of Spencer, Idaho, has sold their clip at 35 cents with 10 cents down. This clip is part fine and part cross clip, and they sold it for three cents under the market. Here in Utah a great deal of wool is sold at from 30 to 34 cents. Heavy short fine wools have sold at 31 cents and the better fine wools up to 34 cents; 27 cents has taken much of the fine wool in Nevada, but it was all sold under its actual market value. Some of the wools that were consigned last spring have been sold in Boston, so as to net the owners in Idaho and Wyoming 37 1/2 cents.

Secretary Lansing Not Responsible for Alleged Leaks

Washington, Jan. 3.—Senator Stone, chairman of the foreign relations committee, speaking from the senate floor today, exonerated Secretary of State Lansing "from any and all blame" for leaks in the state department which Stone had declared resulted from the present civil service system.

Stone's defense of Lansing followed a conference between the senator and the secretary held today.

"In referring to the state department leaks yesterday," Stone said, "I should have explained that the leaks did not occur since Mr. Lansing has been at the head of that department of the government."

"Nothing I stated yesterday referred in any way to Secretary of State Lansing."

To Draw Amendment to Railway Bill

Washington, Jan. 3.—Judge William L. Chambers, United States commissioner of the board of mediation and conciliation, was today requested to prepare an amendment to the proposed railway bill that would give to the courts the right to interpret and enforce the awards of the board of mediation and conciliation.

The request was made to Chambers by members of the Newlands railroad committee, now holding hearings and in charge of the president's railroad program.

During the hearing Senator Underwood compared the proposed arbitration feature of the president's railway program to the peonage law.

Judge Chambers was an unexpected witness at today's session. He pointed out that the one weak point in the president's program is that it does not provide means of enforcing the awards of the mediation board.

Wheat Still Climbs In Chicago Market

Chicago, Jan. 3.—The grain market today continued strong, recording advances almost equal to yesterday's spurt. The general movement was on the buying side, under war impulse.

May wheat opened up 3-4 and at noon had advanced 3 points to \$1.84. July opened up a half and advanced later 2 1/2 to \$1.39 3/4.

Corn had a firm undertone. A large cash house, Rye-Jenks, was a heavy buyer. May opened unchanged, but later advanced 1 3/4 to 96 1/4. July opened down an eighth, but later advanced 1 3/4 to 95 1/8.

Oats were strong with other grains. May opened up quarter and subsequently advanced 5-8 to 56 3/8. July opened up 1-8 and later advanced half to 53 1/4.

Provisions were weak on liquidation of January holdings.
