## RICKARD UNCERTAIN AS TO DARCY MATCH

## Carpentier Has Made No Effort to Come Through—Must Look Elsewhere

(United Press Staff Correspondent.)  
New York, Jan. 6.—Tax Rickard today is wavering on the edge of uncertainty regarding a match between Georges Carpentier, the French champion, and Les Darcy, the Australian pugilist.

Following a United Press dispatch from Paris which told of Carpentier's poor condition, Rickard has received information that Carpentier has not applied for a furlough and that no one else has attempted to get a leave for the boxer soldier.

Rickard is now virtually satisfied it will be virtually impossible to get the Frenchman across the Atlantic. He has not entirely abandoned hope, but he realizes that with Darcy here, and getting for action and with the pub-

lic demanding a chance to see what the Australian can do, something must be done. It is almost certain Darcy's first match will be announced within a week.

Rickard looks with considerable favor on Jack Dillon or Billy Miske as an opponent for Darcy, but it is hardly probable one of these high class men will be used as a trial horse for the Antipodean. Al McCoy, the Brooklyn misfit champion, is believed to be the logical man.

Darcy, meanwhile, is working a vaudeville sketch.

## Les Darcy Enjoys Great Popularity

New York, Jan. 6.—When Les Darcy sailed into New York harbor aboard the big oil tank steamship Cushing he knew his arrival at the Battery was being awaited with great interest in New York. The wireless had told him that. But the Australian marvel was wholly unprepared for the reception with which he was greeted when he started up Broadway to the hotel.

The usual crowd of newspaper men and photographers was on hand at the pier when the tug puffed up alongside, but Darcy didn't tarry there long. He was bundled into a taxicab and taken to his hotel, where a real reception was staged. Guests at the hotel had been warned in advance of the arrival of Darcy and he was greeted accordingly. Visitors crowded into his room to see the velvety muscles and development of the man who has beaten on nearly every opponent with marvelous ease.

Darcy's first night in New York was just one cheer after another. He was cheered by the street boys, who quickly recognized him, as he left his hotel. A few blocks away in Madison Square Garden New York's annual six day bicycle race was in progress and the youthful pugilist was taken there for an introduction. When the announcer mounted his stand and started to tell the audience about it he started something. His closing words were never heard, for the people had begun to cheer and they kept it up constantly while Darcy was in the hall.

New Yorkers have wanted a boxer of Darcy's proportions to cheer for a long time and they didn't stint their feelings. The fact that the pugilist had run away from military service cooled their ardor until the afternoon newspapers came out with the declaration that Darcy intended to return to Great Britain and enlist. Anyway, the New York fight public has grown used to Freddie Welsh, who isn't worrying any about the fate of his country, and they were quick to forget that Darcy had slipped away from recruiting officers.

If Darcy wins his first fight in the United States he will be the most popular man in the fistie world. He will be ready to start the process of getting just as rich as he can as quick as he can.
